ORDINANCE No. 14-001

**AN ORDINANCE AMENDING ARTICLE II (ENFORCEMENT AND
ADMINISTRATIVE ADJUDICATION) OF CHAPTER 74 (TRAFFIC AND VEHICLES)
OF THE VILLAGE CODE**

WHEREAS, the Village of Sauk Village, Cook and Will Counties, Illinois, is a non-home rule municipality pursuant to the Illinois Constitution; and

WHEREAS, the Corporate Authorities have determined that it is necessary for the preservation of public peace, health, safety and welfare of the people of the Village to revise the Village's Ordinance provisions regarding the requirements and procedure for towing and impounding a vehicle as a result of the failure to pay fines for vehicular standing, parking, or compliance regulation violations; and

WHEREAS, the Corporate Authorities of the Village of Sauk Village have determined that it is in the best interest of the Village and its residents that Section 74-35 of the Village Code be amended as further set forth herein.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the President and Board of Trustees of the Village of Sauk Village, Cook County, Illinois, as follows:

Section 1. That the above recitals and legislative findings are found to be true and correct and are hereby incorporated herein and made a part hereof, as if fully set forth in their entirety.

Section 2. Section 74-35 (Immobilization; towing and impoundment) of Article II (Enforcement and Administrative Adjudication) of Chapter 74 (Traffic and Vehicles) of the Village Code is amended by removing the stricken language and adding the underlined language

to provide the following:

Sec. 74-35. Immobilization; towing and impoundment.

(a)

Any vehicle whose registered owner has been determined to be liable for three or more vehicular standing, parking, or compliance regulation violations, for which the fines or penalties assessed remain unpaid, may be immobilized or towed and impounded if:

(1)

The traffic compliance administrator has determined that the registered owner of the vehicle has been determined to be liable for three or more vehicular standing, parking or compliance violations, the fines or penalties for which remain unpaid;

(2)

The person determined to be liable for three or more violations is the registered owner of a motor vehicle located within the village;

(3)

The registers owner of the vehicle has been sent a notice of impounding vehicle immobilization contains the following:

a.

A statement that a final determination has been made that the registered owner is liable for three or more vehicular standing, parking, or compliance regulation violations and the fines and penalties for those violations remain unpaid;

b.

A listing of the violations for which the registered owner has been determined to be liable, which shall include for each violation:

1.

The vehicular standing, parking, or compliance regulation violation notice number;

2.

Date of issuance; and

3.

Total amount of fines and penalties assessed.

c.

A statement that the motor vehicles owned by the person and located within the village is subject to immobilization and/or towing and impoundment if the fines and penalties are not paid within 14 days of the date of the notice;

d.

That the registered owner may contest the validity of the notice by fully completing and signing the request for hearing portion of the notice and by filing the request for hearing with the traffic compliance administrator within 14 days of the date of the notice. The request for hearing shall be deemed filed upon receipt by the traffic compliance administrator;

(4)

The motor vehicle of the registered owner to whom notice of impending vehicle immobilization is sent has failed to make payment of the fines, or penalties as specified in the notice and no timely request for hearing has been filed with the traffic compliance administrator to contest the validity of the notice.

(b)

Upon the receipt of the request for hearing to contest the validity of the notice of impending vehicle immobilization, the traffic compliance administrator shall schedule an administrative

hearing to contest the validity of the notice described above, by disproving liability for the unpaid final determinations of parking, standing, or compliance violation liability listed on the notice, on the next available hearing date, but in no case shall the hearing be scheduled later than 60 days after the request for hearing is filed. The traffic compliance administrator shall serve notice of the hearing date upon the registered owner by first class mail, postage prepaid to the address set forth on the request for hearing. Service of the notice shall be complete on the date it is placed in the United States mail.

(c)

The registered owner of a vehicle which has been immobilized or towed and impounded pursuant to this article shall have the right to a prompt administrative hearing without the requirement of payment of outstanding fines and penalties for which final determination has been made.

(1)

The traffic compliance administrator shall serve a post-immobilization notice upon the registered owner of a vehicle immobilized or towed and impounded pursuant to this article, by first class mail, postage prepaid, containing the following:

a.

Date of immobilization or towing and date of impoundment;

b.

Location of vehicle;

c.

That the vehicle was immobilized pursuant to this article for nonpayment of fines or penalties assessed for three or more violations of vehicular standing, parking, or compliance regulations

for which the registered owner has been determined liable and notified of impending immobilization or towing and impoundment;

d.

Date of notice of impending immobilization or towing and impoundment; and

e.

That the registered owner may contest the validity of the immobilization or towing and impoundment by completing and signing the request for hearing portion of the notice and filing the request for hearing with the traffic compliance administrator within 14 days of the date of the notice. This request shall be deemed filed upon receipt by the traffic compliance administrator.

(2)

Upon the receipt of the request for hearing to contest the validity of the immobilization or towing and impoundment, the traffic compliance administrator shall schedule an administrative hearing to contest the validity of the immobilization or towing and impoundment on the next available hearing date or if sooner scheduled by the traffic compliance administrator for good cause shown, but in no case shall the hearing be scheduled later than 60 days after the request for hearing is filed. The traffic compliance administrator shall serve notice of the hearing date upon the registered owner by first class mail, postage prepaid to the address as is set forth on the request for hearing. Service of the notice shall be complete on the date it is placed in the United States mail.

(3)

An order entered after the hearing to contest the validity of the immobilization or towing and impoundment is a final administrative decision within the meaning of the Illinois Code of Civil Procedure, 735 ILCS 5/101 et seq.

(d)

A vehicle impounded pursuant to this article shall be released to its registered owner upon payment of the fines and penalties due and owing the village as specified in the notice sent in accordance with this Article and the payment of immobilization and towing charges and accrued daily impound charges or upon order of the hearing officer following a hearing contesting the validity of the impoundment.

Section 3. If any section, paragraph, clause or provision of this Ordinance shall be held invalid, the invalidity thereof shall not affect any of the other provisions of this Ordinance.

Section 4. All ordinances, resolutions or motions, or parts thereof, in conflict with the provisions of this Ordinance are to the extent of such conflict hereby repealed.


Section 5. This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect immediately after its passage and publication as required by law.

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

ORDINANCE No. 14-002

**AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CERTAIN SECTIONS OF THE UNIFIED
DEVELOPMENT CODE OF THE VILLAGE OF SAUK VILLAGE**

WHEREAS, the Village of Sauk Village, Cook and Will Counties, Illinois, is a non-home rule municipality pursuant to the Illinois Constitution; and

WHEREAS, the President and the Board of Trustees of the Village of Sauk Village (the “*Corporate Authorities*”) has previously adopted the Unified Development Code in 2008 (the “*Zoning Code*”), as amended from time to time; and

WHEREAS, an amendment application has been submitted requesting a text amendment to certain sections of the Zoning Code establishing medical cannabis cultivation centers and medical cannabis dispensing facilities as special uses in the M-2 Manufacturing District (the “*Proposed Amendments*”); and

WHEREAS, the Zoning Board of Appeals/Plan Commission (the “*Board*”) held a public hearing on October 7, 2013 and December 2, 2013 on whether the Proposed Amendments should be approved, at which time all persons present were afforded an opportunity to be heard; and

WHEREAS, a public notice in the form required by law was given of said October 7 and December 2, 2013 public hearing dates by publication not more than thirty (30) days nor less than fifteen (15) days prior to said public hearing dates in the Southtown Star, a newspaper of general circulation published in this Village; and

WHEREAS, the Board has filed with the Corporate Authorities its minutes and recommendations that the Proposed Amendments to the Zoning Code be granted, and the Corporate Authorities have duly considered said findings of fact and recommendations; and

WHEREAS, the Corporate Authorities have determined, in the best interest of the health, safety and welfare of the residents of the Village, to further amend the text of the Zoning Code.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the President and the Board of Trustees of the Village of Sauk Village, Cook and Will Counties, Illinois, as follows:

SECTION ONE. Recitals. The foregoing recitals are adopted as express findings of the Corporate Authorities of the Village of Sauk Village and are incorporated herein by specific reference.

SECTION TWO. The Corporate Authorities find and determine that the adoption of the Proposed Amendments are in the public interest, and are in furtherance of the progressive demands of orderly Village development.

SECTION THREE. Use “*Manufacturing, Storage and Research Uses*” and “*Retail and Service Uses*” of Table 10-1 “*Manufacturing District Permitted & Special Uses*” of Section 10 “*Manufacturing Districts*” of the Unified Development Code are hereby amended to add the following new underlined language to read, as follows:

SECTION FOUR. Subsection 18.4 “Use Definitions” of Section 18 “Definitions” of the Unified Development Code is hereby amended by adding the following new underlined language to read, as follows:

Medical Cannabis Cultivation Center. An establishment operated by an organization or business that is registered by the Department of Agriculture to perform necessary activities to provide only registered medical cannabis dispensing organizations with usable medical cannabis.

Medical Cannabis Dispensing Facilities. An establishment operated by an organization or business that is registered by the Department of Financial and Professional Regulation to acquire medical cannabis from a registered cultivation center for the purpose of dispensing cannabis, paraphernalia or related supplies and educational materials to registered qualifying patients.

SECTION FIVE. Section 82-305 (“*Additional Standards; Required Criteria*”) is amended by adding the following new subsection to read as follows:

Medical Cannabis Cultivation Centers and Medical Cannabis Dispensing Facilities. Medical cannabis centers and medical cannabis dispensing facilities shall meet all state regulations, as amended from time to time, including but not limited to zoning distance regulations.

SECTION SIX. If any section, paragraph, clause or provision of this Ordinance shall be held invalid, the invalidity thereof shall not affect any other provision of this Ordinance.

SECTION SEVEN. Any ordinance or portion of any ordinance in conflict with any provisions of this Ordinance is hereby repealed solely to the extent of such conflict.

SECTION EIGHT. This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect upon its passage, approval and publication in pamphlet form as provided by law.



ORDINANCE NUMBER 14-003

AN ORDINANCE ESTABLISHING A MINIMUM AND MAXIMUM SETBACK ZONE

WHEREAS, the Village of Sauk Village, Cook County, Illinois (the *AVillage@*) is a duly organized and existing municipal corporation created under the provisions of the laws of the State of Illinois and under the provisions of the Illinois Municipal Code, as from time to time supplemented and amended; and

WHEREAS, it has been determined by the Village of Sauk Village corporate authorities that the continued availability of a natural, uncontaminated supply of water is an important and vital resource benefitting the residents of the Village of Sauk Village, Illinois; and

WHEREAS, the Village of Sauk Village corporate authorities have determined that it is in the best interest of the present and future residents of Sauk Village, both economically and in regard to personal health, that steps be taken to reduce the risk of contamination to the water supply in the Village of Sauk Village from Wells 1, 2, and 3; and

WHEREAS, the Village of Sauk Village is a municipality organized in accordance with the laws of the State of Illinois operating in and supplying water to residents of the Village of Sauk Village; and

WHEREAS, it has been determined by the Village of Sauk Village corporate authorities that restricting the number of future, potential sources of contamination to the water supply of Sauk Village pursuant to the guidelines established by the Illinois Groundwater Protection Act is one reasonable means by which to attempt to provide for a continued, unpolluted source of water for residents of Sauk Village; and

WHEREAS, it has been determined by the Village of Sauk Village corporate authorities that the well-head supply sites for Wells 1, 2, and 3 of the Village of Sauk Village Municipality should be

granted the maximum area of protection permitted by the Illinois Groundwater Protection Act pursuant to information contained in the application for maximum setback line heretofore furnished to the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency; and

WHEREAS, the Village of Sauk Village corporate authorities, at a duly assembled meeting of the board with quorum present, have decided to adopt the following ordinance.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the President and Board of Trustees of the Village of Sauk Village, Cook County, Illinois, as follows:

Section 1. That the above recital is found to be true and correct and is hereby incorporated herein and made a part hereof, as if fully set forth in its entirety.

Section 2. Division 4 (Minimum and Maximum Setback Zone) of Article II (Water) of Chapter 78 (Utilities) of the Municipal Code of the Village of Sauk Village is hereby added and shall provide the following new sections:

MINIMUM AND MAXIMUM SETBACK ZONE ORDINANCE PROVISIONS

Section 78-90. Purpose

Section 78-91. Definitions

Section 78-92. Prohibitions

Section 78-93. Exceptions, and Certifications of Minimal Hazard

Section 78-94. Exclusion

Section 78-95. Appendix A Minimum and Maximum Setback Zone Map and Description

Section 78-90. Purpose

Pursuant to the authority conferred by 65 ILCS 5/11-125-4 (2011); 415 ILCS 5/14.2 (2011), 5/14.3 (2011); 65 ILCS 5/7-4-2 (2011) (property outside of municipality owned by the municipality); 65

ILCS 5/11-125-2 (2011) (property outside of municipality leased by the municipality); and in the interest of securing the public health, safety, and welfare; to preserve the quality and quantity of groundwater resources in order to assure a safe and adequate water supply for present and future generations; and to preserve groundwater resources currently in use and those aquifers having a potential for future use as a public water supply, the provisions of this ordinance shall apply to all properties located within the minimum setback zone established under Section 14.2 of the Environmental Protection Act (“Act”) (415 ILCS 5/14.2) and this ordinance, and the maximum setback zone established under Section 14.3 of the Act (415 ILCS 5/14.3) and this ordinance.

Section 78-91. Definitions

Except as stated in this ordinance, and unless a different meaning of a word or term is clear from the context, the definition of words or terms in this ordinance shall be the same as those used in the Act and the Illinois Groundwater Protection Act (415 ILCS 55/1 (2000)):

“Act” means the Environmental Protection Act (415 ILCS 5/1 (2000)):

“Agency” means the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency.

“Board” means the Illinois Pollution Control Board.

“Maximum setback zone” means the area around a community water supply well established under Section 14.3 of the Act and this ordinance, and described in Appendix A.

“Minimum setback zone” means the area around a community water supply well established under Section 14.2 of the Act and this ordinance, and described in Appendix A.

Section 78-92. Prohibitions

a) Except as provided in Sections 78-93 or 78-94, no person shall place a new potential primary source, a new potential secondary source, or new potential route within the minimum setback zone.

b) Except as provided otherwise in Section 78-93, no person shall place a new potential primary source within the maximum setback zone.

Section 78-93. Exceptions, and Certifications of Minimal Hazard

a) If, pursuant to Section 14.2(c) of the Act, the owner of a new potential primary source (other than land filling or land treating), new potential secondary source, or new potential route is granted and exception by the Board, such owner shall be deemed to have an exception to the same extent from Section 78-92(a) of this ordinance.

b) If, pursuant to Section 14.2(c) of the Act, the owner of a new potential primary source (other than land filling or land treating), is granted an exception by the Board, such owner shall be deemed to have an exception to the same extent from Section 78-92(b) of this ordinance.

c) If, pursuant to Section 14.5 of the Act, the owner of a new potential primary source, new potential secondary source, or new potential route is issued a certificate of minimal hazard by the Agency, such owner shall not be subject to Section 78-92(a) of this ordinance to the same extent that such owner is not subject to Section 14.2(d) of the Act.

Section 78-94. Exclusion

Section 78-92(a) of this ordinance shall not apply to new common sources of sanitary pollution as specified pursuant to Section 17 of the Act and the regulations adopted there under by the Agency; however, no such common sources may be located within the applicable minimum distance from a community water supply well specified by such regulations.

Section 78-95. Appendix A Minimum and Maximum Setback Zone Map and Description

Section 3. If any section, paragraph, clause or provision of this Ordinance shall be held

invalid, the invalidity thereof shall not affect any other provision of this Ordinance.


Section 4. All ordinances, resolutions, motions or orders in conflict with this Ordinance are hereby repealed to the extent of such conflict.



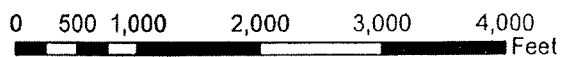

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER 6 “ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGE ESTABLISHMENTS” OF THE VILLAGE MUNICIPAL CODE OF THE VILLAGE OF SAUK VILLAGE, COOK AND WILL COUNTIES, ILLINOIS (LIQUOR LICENSES)

WHEREAS, the Village of Sauk Village, Cook and Will Counties, Illinois (the “Village”) is a duly organized and existing municipal corporation created under the provisions of the laws of the State of Illinois and under the provisions of the Illinois Municipal Code, as from time to time supplemented and amended; and

WHEREAS, the President and Board of Trustees of the Village of Sauk Village (the “*Corporate Authorities*”) regulate the number of liquor licenses that are available for the sale and distribution of alcoholic beverages within the Village; and

WHEREAS, the Corporate Authorities may from time to time amend the text of the Village Code in order to ensure it contains the total number of liquor licenses authorized by the Village; and

WHEREAS, the Corporate Authorities find that it is in the best interests of the health, safety and welfare of its citizenry to amend the number of liquor licenses available of the Village.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE VILLAGE OF SAUK VILLAGE, COOK AND WILL COUNTIES, AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION ONE: That the above recitals are found to be true and correct and are hereby incorporated herein and made a part hereof, as if fully set forth in its entirety.

SECTION TWO: Section 6-25 “*License Classifications and Fees*” of Article II “*Licenses*” of Chapter 6 “*Alcoholic Beverage Establishments*” of the Municipal Code of the Village of Sauk Village is hereby amended by deleting the following stricken language and adding the underlined language to read, as follows:

(1) Class A licenses, set forth below, ~~which~~ shall authorize the retail sale on the premises specified of alcoholic liquor for consumption on the premises. ~~The semiannual fee for such license shall be \$500.00.~~

a. ~~Class A-1 license shall authorize the retail sale on the premises specified of alcoholic liquor for consumption on the premises and shall authorize the holding of~~

~~entertainment consisting of live music only three days of each week, such days to be specified at time application for license is made. The semiannual fee for such license shall be \$600.00.~~

b. Class A-2 licenses shall authorize the retail sale on the premises specified of alcoholic liquor for consumption on the premises. ~~The semiannual fee for such license shall be \$600.00.~~

c. Class A-3 licenses shall authorize the retail sale on the premises specified of alcoholic liquor for consumption on the premises and shall authorize the holding of entertainment consisting of live music and vocalist only three days of each week, such days to be specified at time application is made. ~~The semiannual fee for such license shall be \$700.00.~~

~~d. Class A-4 licenses shall authorize the retail sale on the premises specified of alcoholic liquor for consumption on the premises and shall authorize the holding of entertainment consisting of live music and vocalist on six days each week, such days to be specified at the time application is made. The semiannual fee for such license shall be \$800.00.~~

~~e. Class A-5 licenses shall authorize the retail sale on the premises specified of alcoholic liquor for consumption on the premises, and shall authorize the holding of entertainment, consisting of live music and vocalist only, three days of each week, such days to be specified at time application is made. The semiannual fee for such license shall be \$1,000.00.~~

f. A Class A, ~~Class A-1, Class A-2, or Class A-3 or Class A-4~~ license shall allow the holder thereof to sell cigars, tobacco, cigarettes, soft drinks, confections, ice cream and food when such food is consumed on the premises after securing the necessary licenses and/or permits for the sale of such products, if such licenses and/or permits are required.

(2) Class B licenses.

a. Class B licenses shall authorize the retail sale of alcoholic liquor, but not for consumption on the premises where sold. ~~The semiannual fee for such license shall be \$400.00.~~

b. Class B-1 licenses shall authorize the retail sale of beer and wine but not for consumption on the premises where sold. ~~The semiannual fee for such license shall be \$400.00.~~

(3) Class C licenses.

a. Class C licenses shall authorize the retail sale of alcoholic liquor on the premises of the club specified for consumption on the premises only.

~~b. The semiannual fee for such license shall be computed for each such license at the rate of \$0.50 for each person who is a member of the club on the date of application for a Class C license, or for a renewal thereof, but shall be semiannually not less than \$50.00.~~

(4) Class R-1 licenses shall authorize the retail sale of beer, wine and alcoholic liquor for consumption on restaurant premises in conjunction with the serving of meals. ~~The semiannual license fee for such premises shall be \$300.00.~~ Nothing herein contained shall excuse a holder of such R-1 license from securing any other license or permit, or the payment of the fee thereof, required by statute or ordinance.

(5) Class R-2 licenses shall authorize the retail sale of beer and wine for consumption on restaurant premises in conjunction with the serving of meals. ~~The semiannual license fee for such premises shall be \$200.00.~~ Nothing herein contained shall excuse a holder of such R-2 license from securing any other license or permit, or the payment of the fee thereof, required by statute or ordinance.

(6) Class R-3 licenses shall authorize the retail sale of beer and wine for consumption on restaurant premises in conjunction with the serving of meals. ~~The semiannual license fee for such premises shall be \$200.00.~~ Nothing herein shall excuse the holder of such R-3 license from securing any other license or permit, or the payment of the fees thereof, required by statute or ordinance.

(7) Class O-1 licenses.

a. Class O-1 licenses shall authorize the sale of alcoholic liquor in an enclosed outdoor area. To qualify for an O-1 license, the applicant must hold a current valid liquor license, as such licenses are classified in this section. Class O-1 licenses shall comply with the provisions of this section.

b. An applicant for a Class O-1 liquor license shall apply for the license on a form provided by the village from the office of the liquor commission. The liquor commission shall notify the board of trustees of the receipt of the application and transmit a copy of the application and other pertinent information to the board of trustees. The liquor commissioner shall schedule a public hearing before the board of trustees after proper legal notice has been given as provided herein. The applicant shall be required, not less than seven days before the hearing, to notify property owners of said hearing who are located within 250 feet in each direction of the proposed establishment, provided that the number of feet occupied by all public roads, streets, alleys and other public ways shall be excluded in computing the 250 feet requirement. Service of the notice shall be either in person or by registered or certified mail, return receipt requested. Property owners shall be those persons recorded with the county recorder of deeds or the county registrar of titles, or appearing on the authentic tax records of the county treasurer. As part of the application, the petitioner must provide basic information with respect to fencing and lighting and, at minimum, provide the following:

1. A sketch clearly delineating the area to be fenced. The fence must be a minimum of six feet high, of solid board construction and meet all other requirements of the village's fence ordinance.
2. If the area of the proposed establishment is to have lighting, the petitioner must submit proof that the light will not extend outside of the fenced area and disturb adjacent property owners.

c. The establishment must also comply with the following restrictions:

1. The noise decibel level outside of the fenced area shall not exceed 85 decibels DBA within three feet of the fence.
2. The outdoor area shall be closed to the public no later than 10:00 p.m.

d. ~~The license fee for an O-1 liquor license shall be \$200.00 per licensing period. The license period shall be from May 1 through October 31 each year.~~

SECTION THREE: Section 6-33 “*Consumption on premises without specified license or special use permit.*” of Article II “*Licenses*” of Chapter 6 “*Alcoholic Beverage Establishments*” of the Municipal Code of the Village of Sauk Village is hereby amended by deleting the stricken language to read, as follows:

It shall be unlawful for anyone not having a ~~Class A, A-1, A-2, A-3, C, R-1 or R-3~~ license or special use permit to sell or offer for sale any alcoholic liquor for consumption on the premises where sold, or to permit the same to be consumed on the premises where sold.

SECTION FOUR: Section 6-62 “*Closing Hours*” of Article III “*Standards*” of Chapter 6 “*Alcoholic Beverage Establishments*” of the Municipal Code of the Village of Sauk Village are hereby amended by deleting the stricken language and adding the underlined language to read, as follows:

~~(a) It shall be unlawful for holders of Class A or A-1 liquor licenses to sell or offer for sale at retail any alcoholic liquor between the hours of 1:00 a.m. and 6:00 a.m. of any day, except that on Friday and Saturday nights alcoholic liquor may be sold upon duly licensed premises until 3:00 a.m. the following morning; such premises shall not reopen before 12:00 noon on Sundays.~~

(b) It shall be unlawful for the holders of Class A-2 and A-3 licenses to sell or offer for sale at retail any alcoholic liquor between the hours of 2:00 a.m. and 6:00 a.m. of any day, except that on Friday and Saturday nights alcoholic liquor may be sold upon duly licensed premises until 4:00 a.m. the following morning; such premises shall not reopen before 12:00 noon on Sundays.

~~(c) It shall be unlawful for the holder of a Class A-5 license to sell or offer for sale at retail any alcoholic liquor between the hours of 4:00 a.m. and 6:00 a.m. of any day, except that on Sundays,~~

~~it shall be unlawful for the holder of a Class A-5 license to sell or offer for sale at retail any alcoholic liquor between the hours of 4:00 a.m. and 12:00 noon.~~

(i) The owner and employees of ~~Class A, Class A-1~~, Class A-2, and Class A-3 licensed establishments shall vacate the licensed premises no later than 15 minutes after the established closing hours. Any provision for the cleaning of the premises during the hours which the premises are closed must be previously arranged with the liquor commission.

(j) Holders of ~~Class A, Class A-1~~, Class A-2, and Class A-3 ~~and Class A-5~~ licenses may remain open from New Year's Eve until 4:00 a.m. on New Year's Day, with written permission from the Liquor Commissioner.

(k) Holders of ~~Class A, Class A-1~~, Class A-2, Class A-3 and Class C licenses shall close at 6:00 p.m. on Christmas Eve.

SECTION FIVE: Article II "*Licenses*" of Chapter 6 "*Alcoholic Beverage Establishments*" of the Municipal Code of the Village of Sauk Village is hereby amended by adding the following new section to read, as follows:

Sec. 6-35 Fees for Licenses.

The fees for alcoholic liquor licenses shall be as follows:

Class A-2: \$900.00 semi-annually

Class A-3: \$1,000.00 semi-annually

Class B: \$700.00 semi-annually

Class B-1: \$700.00 semi-annually

Class C: \$0.50 per member semi-annually

Class R-1: \$600.00 semi-annually

Class R-2: \$500.00 semi-annually

Class R-3: \$500.00 semi-annually

Class O: \$500.00 annually

SECTION SIX: In Section Four of this Ordinance, the amendment amending Subsection 6-62(b) will become effective on July 1, 2014 at 12:00 a.m. All other Sections and subsections of Section Four contained in this Ordinance shall go into effect in accordance with Section Nine of this Ordinance.

SECTION SEVEN: If any section, paragraph, clause or provision of this ordinance shall be held invalid, the invalidity thereof shall not affect any of the other provisions of this ordinance.

SECTION EIGHT: All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed insofar as they conflict herewith.

SECTION NINE: This ordinance shall be in full force and effect immediately after its passage and publication as required by law.

(NUMBER OF LIQUOR LICENSES)**

WHEREAS, the Village of Sauk Village, Cook and Will Counties, Illinois (the “Village”) is a duly organized and existing municipal corporation created under the provisions of the laws of the State of Illinois and under the provisions of the Illinois Municipal Code, as from time to time supplemented and amended; and

WHEREAS, the Mayor and Board of Trustees of the Village of Sauk Village (the “*Corporate Authorities*”) regulate the number of liquor licenses that are available for the sale and distribution of alcoholic beverages within the Village; and

WHEREAS, the Corporate Authorities may from time to time amend the text of the Village Code in order to ensure it contains the total number of liquor licenses authorized by the Village; and

WHEREAS, the Corporate Authorities find that it is in the best interests of the health, safety and welfare of its citizenry to amend the number of liquor licenses available of the Village.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE PRESIDENT AND BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE VILLAGE OF SAUK VILLAGE, COOK AND WILL COUNTIES, AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION ONE: That the above recitals are found to be true and correct and are hereby incorporated herein and made a part hereof, as if fully set forth in its entirety.

SECTION TWO: Section 6-30 “*Number of Licenses*” of Article II “*Licenses*” of Chapter 6 “*Alcoholic Beverage Establishments*” of the Municipal Code of the Village of Sauk Village is hereby amended by deleting the stricken language and adding the underlined language to read, as follows:

Sec. 6-30. Number of licenses.

- (a) There shall be issued in the village no more than:
- (1) ~~Three~~ Two licenses among ~~Class A, Class A-1, Class A-2 and Class A-3 and Class A-5;~~
 - (2) ~~One Class A-5 license;~~
 - (2) ~~Four~~ Three Class B licenses;

- (3) ~~Four~~ One Class B-1 licenses;
- (4) ~~Two~~ Zero Class R-1 licenses;
- (5) One Class R-2 license; and
- (6) ~~One~~ Zero Class R-3 license.
- (7) Zero Class O license

(b) Class C licenses and special use permits shall be issued as requested upon compliance with all provisions of this chapter.

(c) Whenever a license previously issued under this chapter is revoked, surrendered, nonrenewed or terminated by dormancy as herein provided in this chapter, the maximum number of licenses in the class of the license which is revoked, surrendered, nonrenewed or terminated by dormancy as set forth in subsection (a) of this section shall be automatically and immediately reduced by one.

SECTION THREE: If any section, paragraph, clause or provision of this ordinance shall be held invalid, the invalidity thereof shall not affect any of the other provisions of this ordinance.

SECTION FOUR: All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed insofar as they conflict herewith.

AN ORDINANCE ADOPTING A SOCIAL MEDIA POLICY FOR THE VILLAGE OF SAUK VILLAGE

WHEREAS, the Village of Sauk Village, Counties of Cook and Will, State of Illinois (the “Village”) is a duly organized and existing municipality and unit of local government created under the provisions of the laws of the State of Illinois, and is operating under the provisions of the Illinois Municipal Code, and all laws amendatory thereof and supplementary thereto, with full powers to enact ordinances and adopt resolutions for the benefit of the residents of the Village; and

WHEREAS, the Village President (the “President”) and Board of Trustees of the Village (the Village Board and together with the President the “Corporate Authorities”) are committed to adopting employment policies necessary to ensure the efficient operation of the Village; and

WHEREAS, in connection with the foregoing, the Corporate Authorities have determined that it is necessary, advisable and in the best interests of the Village to establish guidelines for Village employees’ use of social media; and

WHEREAS, such guidelines are designed to assist Village employees in using social media in a manner that does not compromise the Village’s ability to provide governmental services to Village residents; and

WHEREAS, in connection with the foregoing, the Corporate Authorities have determined that it is necessary and in the best interests of the Village to adopt a social media policy (the “Policy”), a copy of which is attached hereto and incorporated herein as Exhibit A.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the President and the Board of Trustees of the Village of Sauk Village, Counties of Cook and Will, and the State of Illinois, as follows:

**ARTICLE I.
IN GENERAL**

Section 1: Incorporation Clause.

The Corporate Authorities hereby find that all of the recitals hereinbefore stated as contained in the preambles to this Ordinance are full, true, and correct and do hereby, by reference, incorporate and make them part of this Ordinance as legislative findings.

Section 2: Purpose.

The purpose of this Ordinance is to adopt the Policy to establish guidelines for using social media in a manner that does not compromise the Village's ability to provide governmental services to Village residents, to authorize the President or his designee to take such steps as are necessary to carry out the intent of this Ordinance, and to ratify any actions previously taken that are consistent with the intent of this Ordinance.

**ARTICLE II.
AUTHORIZATION**

Section 3: Authorization.

That the Village Board hereby authorizes and directs the adoption of the Policy set forth on Exhibit A, with such modifications thereto as shall be approved by the President and the Village Attorney. To ensure that the Policy remains current and effective, the Village Board authorizes the President or his designee to make revisions to the Policy from time-to-time as needed. The Policy supersedes any previously adopted policies regarding social media use. The Village Board further authorizes the President or his designee to execute any and all documentation that

may be necessary to carry out the intent of this Ordinance. The officers, employees, and/or agents of the Village shall take all action necessary or reasonably required by the Village to carry out, give effect to and consummate the intent of this Ordinance. Any and all actions previously performed in connection with carrying out and consummating the intent of this Ordinance are hereby authorized, approved, and ratified by this reference.

**ARTICLE III.
HEADINGS, SAVINGS CLAUSES, PUBLICATION, EFFECTIVE DATE**

Section 4: Headings.

The headings of the articles, sections, paragraphs, and subparagraphs of this Ordinance are inserted solely for convenience of reference and form no substantive part of this Ordinance nor should they be used in any interpretation or construction of any substantive provision of this Ordinance.

Section 5: Severability.

The provisions of this Ordinance are hereby declared to be severable and should any provision of this Ordinance be determined to be in conflict with any law, statute, or regulation by a court of competent jurisdiction, said provision shall be excluded and deemed inoperative, unenforceable, and as though not provided for herein, and all other provisions shall remain unaffected, unimpaired, valid, and in full force and effect.

Section 6: Superseder.

All code provisions, ordinances, resolutions, rules, and orders, or parts thereof, in conflict herewith are, to the extent of such conflict, hereby superseded.

Section 7: Publication.

A full, true, and complete copy of this Ordinance shall be published in pamphlet form or in a newspaper published and of general circulation within the Village as provided by the Illinois Municipal Code, as amended.

Section 8: Effective Date.

This Ordinance shall be effective and in full force immediately upon passage and approval.

EXHIBIT A

Social Media Policy

At the Village of Sauk Village we understand that social media can be a fun and rewarding way to share your life and opinions with family, friends, and co-workers around the world. However, use of social media also presents certain risks and carries with it certain responsibilities. To assist you in making responsible decisions about your use of social media, we have established these guidelines for appropriate use of social media.

This policy applies to all employees who work for the Village of Sauk Village.

GUIDELINES

In the rapidly expanding world of electronic communications, “social media” can mean many things. “Social media” includes all means of communicating or posting information or content of any sort on the Internet, including to your own or someone else’s web log or blog, journal or diary, personal web site, social networking or affinity web site, web bulletin board or a chat room, whether or not employed or affiliated with the Village of Sauk Village, as well as any other form of electronic communication.

Ultimately, you are solely responsible for what you post online. Before creating online content, consider some of the risks and rewards that are involved. Keep in mind that any of your conduct that adversely affects your job performance, the performance of fellow employees or otherwise adversely affects members, customers, suppliers, people who work on behalf of the Village of Sauk Village or the Village of Sauk Village’s legitimate business interests may result in disciplinary action up to and including termination.

Know and follow the rules

Carefully read these guidelines, as well as all other Village of Sauk Village written employment policies, procedures, notices, memoranda and manuals, and ensure your postings are consistent with these policies. Inappropriate postings that may include discriminatory remarks, harassment, and threats of violence or similar inappropriate or unlawful conduct will not be tolerated and may subject you to disciplinary action up to and including termination.

Be respectful

Always be fair and courteous to fellow employees, customers, members, suppliers or people who work on behalf of the Village of Sauk Village. Also, keep in mind that you are more likely to resolve work-related complaints by speaking directly with your co-workers or by utilizing our Open Door Policy than by posting complaints to a social media outlet. Nevertheless, if you decide to post complaints or criticism, avoid using statements, photographs, video or audio that reasonably could be viewed as malicious, obscene, threatening, or intimidating, that disparage customers, members, or employees or suppliers, or that might constitute harassment by bullying.

Examples of such conduct might include offensive posts meant to intentionally harm someone's reputation or posts that could contribute to a hostile work environment on the basis of race, sex, disability, religion or any other status protected by law or company policy.

Be honest and accurate

Make sure you are always honest and accurate when posting information and if you make a mistake, correct it quickly. Be open about any previous posts you have altered. Remember that the Internet archives almost everything; therefore, even deleted postings can be searched. Never post any information or rumors that you know to be false about the Village of Sauk Village, fellow employees, members, customers, suppliers, or people working on behalf of the Village of Sauk Village.

Post only appropriate and respectful content

- Maintain the confidentiality of private or confidential information of the Village of Sauk Village and any other agency that the Village of Sauk Village represents. Do not post internal reports, policies, procedures or other internal business-related confidential communications.
- Do not create a link from your blog, website or other social networking site to a Village of Sauk Village website without identifying yourself as a Village of Sauk Village employee.
- Express only your personal opinions. Never represent yourself as a spokesperson for the Village of Sauk Village. If the Village of Sauk Village is a subject of the content you are creating, be clear and open about the fact that you are an employee and make it clear that your views do not represent those of the Village of Sauk Village, fellow employees, members, customers, suppliers or people working on behalf of the Village of Sauk Village. If you do publish a blog or post online related to the work you do or subjects employed with the Village of Sauk Village, make it clear that you are not speaking on behalf of the Village of Sauk Village. It is best to include a disclaimer such as, "The postings on this site are my own and do not necessarily reflect the view of the Village of Sauk Village."

Using social media at work

Refrain from using social media while on work time or on equipment provided by the Village of Sauk Village, unless it is work-related as authorized by your manager or consistent with the Village's Equipment Policy. Do not use your Village of Sauk Village issued email addresses to register on social networks, blogs or other online tools utilized for personal use.

Retaliation is prohibited

The Village of Sauk Village prohibits taking negative action against any employee for reporting a possible deviation from this Policy or for cooperating in an investigation. Any employee who retaliates against another employee for reporting a possible deviation from this Policy or for cooperating in an investigation will be subject to disciplinary action, up to and including termination.

Media contacts

Employees should not speak to the media on the Village of Sauk Village's behalf without contacting the appropriate Department Head or Village Administrator. All media inquiries should be directed to them.

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING SECTIONS 18-29 (FEE SCHEDULE), 10-41 (LICENSING), 74-245 (FEE), 74-247 (TIME OF PAYMENT; LICENSE YEAR), AND 74-250 (DUPLICATE WINDSHIELD DECAL) OF THE VILLAGE CODE

WHEREAS, the Village of Sauk Village, Cook and Will Counties, Illinois, is a non-home rule municipality pursuant to the Illinois Constitution; and

WHEREAS, the Corporate Authorities of the Village of Sauk Village have determined that it is in the best interest of the Village and its residents that Sections 18-29 (FEE SCHEDULE), 10-41 (LICENSING), 74-245 (FEE), 74-247 (TIME OF PAYMENT; LICENSE YEAR), AND 74-250 (DUPLICATE WINDSHIELD DECAL) of the Village Code be amended as further set forth herein.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the President and the Board of Trustees of the Village Of Sauk Village, Cook and Will Counties, Illinois, as follows:

SECTION ONE. Recitals. The foregoing recitals are adopted as express findings of the Corporate Authorities of the Village of Sauk Village and are incorporated herein by specific reference.

SECTION TWO. That Section 18-29, entitled "Fee Schedule," of Chapter 18, entitled "Businesses and Business Regulations," of the Village Code, as amended, be and is hereby further amended by removing the stricken language and adding the underlined language as provided below:

Sec. 18-29. Fee schedule.

The license fees for the businesses, occupations, activities or uses set forth in this section shall be as indicated below. In addition, the presence of a license fee in this article shall, in the absence of any other provision of this Code requiring a license for such business, occupation, activity or use, be deemed to be a requirement of a license for such business, activity, occupation or use. With respect to business licenses, the license fee shall include two health inspection and one fire inspection. The license fee shall not include any health reinspections thereafter and there shall be a charge of \$ 60.00 for each health reinspection. There shall be no charge for the first fire reinspection if all deficiencies found in the initial fire inspection have been corrected before the first fire reinspection. If all deficiencies found in the initial fire inspection have not been corrected before the first fire reinspection, there shall be a charge of \$ 25.00 for the first fire reinspection, \$ 40.00 for the second fire reinspection and \$ 60.00 for the third and each succeeding fire reinspection.

(c)

License fees based on square footage shall be based only on interior space in the structure or structures used for the business of the facility and not on parking lots, storage or similar outdoor areas.

SECTION THREE. That Subsection (b) of Section 10-41, entitled "Licensing," of Chapter 10, entitled "Animal Control," of the Village Code, as amended, be and is hereby further amended by removing the stricken language and adding the underlined language as provided below:

Sec. 10-41. Licensing.

(b) Fees. The license fee for a dog or cat that has been neutered or spayed shall be \$ 10.00, to be paid to the village clerk prior to the issuance of a license. The license fee for a dog or cat that has not been neutered or spayed shall be \$ 25.00, to be paid to the village clerk prior to the issuance of a license. A senior citizen may obtain one dog or one cat license per year for a reduced fee of \$5.00, if the dog or cat is neutered or spayed.

SECTION FOUR. That Section 74-254, entitled "Fee," of Chapter 74, entitled "Traffic and Vehicles," of the Village Code, as amended, be and is hereby further amended by removing the stricken language and adding the underlined language as provided below:

Sec. 74-245. Fee.

SECTION FIVE. That Subsection (b) of Section 74-247, entitled “Time of Payment; license year,” of Chapter 74, entitled “Traffic and Vehicles,” of the Village Code, as amended, be and is hereby further amended by removing the stricken language and adding the underlined language as provided below:

Sec. 74-247. Time of payment; license year.

(b)

The fee required in accordance with the schedule set forth in Section 74-245 of the Code shall double if not paid prior to the expiration of the previous year’s license; provided, however, that the purchaser of a new motor vehicle or motor bicycle, to which a license has not already been transferred, or a new resident of the Village shall be given forty-five (45) days from the date of purchase of the motor vehicle or motor bicycle and thirty (30) days from the establishment of residency within the Village within which to pay the required fee without penalty.

SECTION SIX. That Section 74-250, entitled “Duplicate windshield decal,” of Chapter 74, entitled “Traffic and Vehicles,” of the Village Code, as amended, be and is hereby further amended by removing the stricken language and adding the underlined language as provided below:

Sec. 74-250. Duplicate windshield decal.

Application for a duplicate windshield decal or tag, due to transfer or replacement of the original decal or tag, shall be made to the village clerk. The applicant shall pay a replacement fee of \$ 15.00 before the duplicate windshield decal or tag will be issued.

SECTION SEVEN. If any section, paragraph, clause or provision of this Ordinance shall be held invalid, the invalidity thereof shall not affect any other provision of this Ordinance.

SECTION EIGHT. Any ordinance or portion of any ordinance in conflict with any provisions of this Ordinance is hereby repealed solely to the extent of such conflict.





ORDINANCE No. 14-008

**AN ORDINANCE OF THE VILLAGE OF SAUK VILLAGE, COOK AND WILL
COUNTIES, ILLINOIS AUTHORIZING THE SALE OF SURPLUS REAL ESTATE**

WHEREAS, the Village of Sauk Village, Cook and Will Counties, Illinois (the “*Village*”) is a duly organized and existing municipal corporation created under the provisions of the laws of the State of Illinois and under the provisions of the Illinois Municipal Code, as from time to time supplemented and amended; and

WHEREAS, the Village may sell surplus real estate pursuant to and in accordance with 65 ILCS 5/11-76-4.1; and

WHEREAS, the Village is the owner of record of property commonly known as 2842 E. 225th Place, Sauk Village, Illinois (the “*Subject Property*”), which is legally described on Exhibit A, a copy of which is attached hereto and made a part hereof; and

WHEREAS, the Subject Property is a residential home with 1,073 square feet of living area, on a 66’ x 111’ lot, which is zoned R-1 Single Family Residential; and

WHEREAS, the Village acquired the Subject Property by donation from HSBC Bank USA, National Association, as Trustee for Home Equity Loan Trust Series ACE 2005-HE5 on or about January 4, 2013 by quit claim deed recorded on or about January 28, 2013 as document number 1302855035; and

WHEREAS, the Village owns scattered and underutilized lots located throughout the corporate boundaries of the Village that serve no public use to the residents of the Village, needlessly inhibit development and deprive the Village and other taxing bodies from realizing real estate taxes; and

WHEREAS, the Corporate Authorities have determined that the Subject Property is no longer necessary, appropriate, required for the use of, profitable to or serve any viable use to the Village and that the sale of the Subject Property will eliminate burdensome maintenance cost and generate needed real estate tax and other revenues for the Village; and

WHEREAS, the Village continually seeks to attract development projects and has attempted various strategies to spur redevelopment of vacant property within its corporate boundaries, including the Subject Property; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to State statute the value of the Subject Property was determined by a State certified licensed real estate appraiser in an appraisal report, a copy of which is attached hereto and made a part hereof as Exhibit B; and

WHEREAS, Westwood Development, Inc. (the "*Westwood*") has requested to purchase the Subject Property at its appraised value, as set forth in the Real Estate Contract, a copy of which is attached hereto and made a part hereof as Exhibit C; and

WHEREAS, after due consideration, the President and Board of Trustees of the Village of Sauk Village (the "*Corporate Authorities*") have determined that the sale of the Subject Property to Westwood will serve to prevent blight and increase the value of all adjacent property while simultaneously improving the aesthetic appearance of the area; and

WHEREAS, the Corporate Authorities believe it is in the best interest of the Village, as Seller, to sell the Subject Property to Westwood, as Buyer, on the following condition: (1) Westwood takes title to the Subject Property in its "*as is*" and with all faults and conditions, including the location of any foundation and such other debris or material in, on or underneath the Subject Property and further agrees to fully and completely indemnify the Village, its officers, attorneys, consultants and employees against any and all known or unknown

environmental conditions, remediation requirements and any and all title deficiencies or errors in existence on the Subject Property; and (2) that Westwood executes a release that shall hold harmless the Village, its officers, attorneys, consultants and employees for any and all damage to the Property, alleged or otherwise, suffered at any time prior to or after the sale of the Subject Property.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the President and Board of Trustees of the Village of Sauk Village, Cook and Will Counties, Illinois, as follows:

Section 1. That the above recitals and legislative findings are found to be true and correct and are hereby incorporated herein and made a part hereof, as if fully set forth in their entirety.

Section 2. The Subject Property is hereby declared surplus property of the Village and the conveyance of the Subject Property to Westwood, in accordance with the terms and conditions herein contained, is hereby approved, with such necessary changes as authorized by the Mayor.

Section 3. The Mayor and Village Clerk are hereby authorized and directed to execute and deliver any and all other document necessary to implement the provisions, terms and conditions of this Ordinance, including the conveyance of the Subject Property, as herein described.

Section 4. The Village Attorney, Finance Director and Village Treasurer are hereby authorized to undertake actions on the part of the Village, including the allocation of funds necessary to effectuate the conveyance of the Subject Property to complete satisfaction of any conditions stated herein.

Section 5. The Village Attorney, Finance Director and Village Treasurer are hereby authorized to settle outstanding real estate taxes on the Subject Property and any and all such

other financial matters or requirements necessary to convey the Subject Property, as specified herein.

Section 6. If any section, paragraph, clause or provision of this Ordinance shall be held invalid, the invalidity thereof shall not affect any other provision of this Ordinance.

Section 7. All ordinances, resolutions, motions or orders in conflict with this Ordinance are hereby repealed to the extent of such conflict.

Section 8. This Ordinance shall take effect immediately upon passage to protect the health safety and welfare of the village to ensure the property does not stay empty.



WHEREAS, the Village of Sauk Village, Counties of Cook and Will, State of Illinois (the "Village") is a duly organized and existing village and unit of local government created under the provisions of the laws of the State of Illinois, and is operating under the provisions of the Illinois Municipal Code, as supplemented and amended, with the full power to enact ordinances and adopt resolutions for the benefit of its residents; and

WHEREAS, on June 11, 2002, the Board of Trustees of the Village (the "Village Board") and the Village Mayor, who is also the President of the Village Board, (the "President" and with the Village Board, the "Corporate Authorities") passed and approved an ordinance designated as Ordinance No. 02-24 (the "Bond Ordinance"), which provided for the borrowing of money and the issuance of General Obligation Tax Increment Refunding Bonds, Series 2002A, of the Village, in an amount not to exceed Nine Million, Seven Hundred Fifty-Five Thousand and No/100 U.S. Dollars (\$9,755,000.00) and General Obligation Capital Appreciation Bonds (Tax Increment Alternate Revenue Source), Series 2002B, of the Village, in an amount not to exceed Five Million and No/100 U.S. Dollars (\$5,000,000.00) (collectively, the "Bonds"); and

WHEREAS, on June 27, 2002, acting pursuant to the Bond Ordinance, the President and the Village Clerk executed a bond determination (the "Bond Determination"), which provided certain terms for the Bonds; and

WHEREAS, Article XVIII of the Bond Determination provides for the levy of taxes in the Village's tax levy year 2013 sufficient to provide One Million, Nine Hundred Eleven Thousand, Five Hundred Seventy Two and 50/100 U.S. Dollars (\$1,911,572.50) for the purpose of paying the principal of and/or the interest on the Bonds; and

WHEREAS, Article XX of the Bond Ordinance provides that:

"As part of the plan of financing of the Parity Bonds, it is intended and anticipated that tax revenues deposited in the TIF No. II Special Tax Allocation Fund and the TIF No. III Special Tax Allocation Fund be transferred to the Bond Fund and used to abate the taxes hereby levied. Unless otherwise directed by ordinance, the Treasurer of the Village shall deposit from the TIF No. II Special Tax Allocation Fund and the TIF No. III Special Tax Allocation Fund the amount of tax revenues available which shall result in taxes to be abated, and such deposit shall be made

prior to any such abatement being filed with the County Clerks of the Counties of Cook and Will, Illinois, as the tax extension officers for the Village. No taxes will be abated unless and until the full amount of such abatement has been deposited irrevocably into the Bond Fund and dedicated to the payment of such Parity Bonds.”

; and

WHEREAS, since the Village has received documentation from the Trustee (as defined in the Bond Ordinance) certifying that funds are available to pay the principal of and interest on the Bonds and those funds are or will be on deposit in the Bond Fund (as defined in the Bond Ordinance), the Corporate Authorities are required by the Bond Ordinance to abate the levy described above and to cause proper notification of that abatement to be filed with the County Clerks of Cook County and Will County, Illinois; and

WHEREAS, based on the foregoing, the Corporate Authorities have determined that it is in the best interests of the Village and its residents to abate the levy of taxes as set forth herein;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the President and the Board of Trustees of the Village of Sauk Village, Cook and Will Counties, Illinois, as follows:

SECTION 1: The preambles to this Ordinance are found to be full, true and correct and are hereby incorporated into the terms of this Ordinance as if fully set forth herein. This Ordinance is adopted pursuant to the authority granted to the Village by the Constitution of the State of Illinois, the common law, the Illinois Compiled Statutes, Village ordinances and resolutions and all other applicable laws. All applicable provisions of the Illinois Compiled Statutes, including the Illinois Municipal Code, as may be amended from time to time, relating to the purpose of this Ordinance are incorporated herein by this reference.

SECTION 2: The Village Treasurer is authorized and directed to take all steps necessary to ensure that the sum of One Million, Nine Hundred Eleven Thousand, Five Hundred Seventy Two and 50/100 U.S. Dollars (\$1,911,572.50) has been or will be transferred to the Bond Fund, created by the Bond Ordinance, within three (3) calendar days after the adoption of this Ordinance, which sum shall be irrevocably pledged for the payment of the principal and interest due on the Bonds. The Village Treasurer is directed to provide the Village Clerk with such certificates or such other evidence as the Village Clerk may deem necessary to determine that the transfer has been completed. There is hereby abated the sum of One Million, Nine Hundred Eleven Thousand, Five Hundred Seventy Two and 50/100 U.S. Dollars (\$1,769,927.00) of the levy of taxes for the Village’s tax levy year 2013, being the levy appearing and set forth in Article XVIII of the Bond Determination. It is intended that this abatement shall apply to the entire amount scheduled to be levied for the Village’s tax levy year 2013 pursuant to the terms of the Bond Determination. Having received certificates or such other evidence as the Village Clerk deems necessary to determine that the transfer described in this Section of this

Ordinance has been completed, the Village Clerk is directed to file, or cause the filing of a certified copy of this Ordinance with the offices of the County Clerks of Cook County and Will County, Illinois.

SECTION 3: The headings of the sections, paragraphs and subparagraphs of this Ordinance are inserted solely for the convenience of reference and form no substantive part of this Ordinance nor should they be used in any interpretation or construction of any substantive provision of this Ordinance. The provisions of this Ordinance are hereby declared to be severable. If any portion of this Ordinance is held to be invalid or determined to be in conflict with any law, statute or regulation by a court of competent jurisdiction, said portion shall be stricken from this Ordinance and the remaining portions of this Ordinance shall continue in full force and effect to the fullest extent possible. All codes, provisions, ordinances, resolutions and orders, or parts thereof, in conflict herewith are, to the extent of such conflict, hereby superseded. This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after the date of its passage, approval and publication in pamphlet form as provided by law.





ILLINOIS.**

WHEREAS, the Village of Sauk Village, Counties of Cook and Will, State of Illinois (the "Village") is a duly organized and existing village and unit of local government created under the provisions of the laws of the State of Illinois, and is operating under the provisions of the Illinois Municipal Code, as supplemented and amended, with the full power to enact ordinances and adopt resolutions for the benefit of its residents; and

WHEREAS, on December 9, 2008, the Board of Trustees of the Village (the "Village Board") and the Village Mayor, who is also the President of the Village Board, (the "President" and with the Village Board, the "Corporate Authorities") passed and approved an ordinance designated as Ordinance No. 08-67 (the "Bond Ordinance"), which provided for the borrowing of money and the issuance of General Obligation Tax Increment Bonds (Alternate Revenue Source), Series 2008, of the Village, in an amount not to exceed Nine Million, Five Hundred Thousand and No/100 U.S. Dollars (\$9,500,000.00) (the "Bonds"); and

WHEREAS, on December 18, 2008, acting pursuant to the Bond Ordinance, the President and the Village Clerk executed a bond determination (the "Bond Determination"), which provided certain terms for the Bonds; and

WHEREAS, Section 10 of the Bond Determination provides for the levy of taxes in the Village's tax levy year 2013 sufficient to provide Seven Hundred Thirty Four Thousand, One Hundred Thirty Five and 00/100 U.S. Dollars (\$734,135.00) for the purpose of paying the principal of and/or the interest on the Bonds; and

WHEREAS, Article XIX of the Bond Ordinance provides that:

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the President and the Board of Trustees of the Village of Sauk Village, Cook and Will Counties, Illinois, as follows:

SECTION 1: The preambles to this Ordinance are found to be full, true and correct and are hereby incorporated into the terms of this Ordinance as if fully set forth herein. This Ordinance is adopted pursuant to the authority granted to the Village by the Constitution of the State of Illinois, the common law, the Illinois Compiled Statutes, Village ordinances and resolutions and all other applicable laws. All applicable provisions of the Illinois Compiled Statutes, including the Illinois Municipal Code, as may be amended from time to time, relating to the purpose of this Ordinance are incorporated herein by this reference.

SECTION 2: The Village Treasurer is authorized and directed to take all steps necessary to ensure that the sum of Seven Hundred Thirty Four Thousand, One Hundred Thirty Five and 00/100 U.S. Dollars (\$734,135.00) has been or will be transferred to the Bond Fund, created by the Bond Ordinance, within three (3) calendar days after the adoption of this Ordinance, which sum shall be irrevocably pledged for the payment of the principal and interest due on the Bonds. The Village Treasurer is directed to provide to the Village Clerk with such certificates or such other evidence as the Village Clerk may deem necessary to determine that the transfer has been completed. There is hereby abated the sum of Seven Hundred Thirty Four Thousand, One Hundred Thirty Five and 00/100 U.S. Dollars (\$734,135.00) of the levy of taxes for the Village’s tax levy year 2013, being the levy appearing and set forth in Section 10 of the Bond Determination. It is intended that this abatement shall apply to the entire amount scheduled to be levied for the Village’s tax levy year 2013 pursuant to the terms of the Bond Determination. Having received certificates or such other evidence as the Village Clerk deems necessary to determine that the transfer described in this Section of this Ordinance has been completed, the Village Clerk is directed to file, or cause the filing of a certified copy of this Ordinance with the offices of the County Clerks of Cook County and Will County, Illinois.

SECTION 3: The headings of the sections, paragraphs and subparagraphs of this Ordinance are inserted solely for the convenience of reference and form no substantive part of this Ordinance nor should they be used in any interpretation or construction of any substantive provision of this Ordinance. The provisions of this Ordinance are hereby declared to be severable. If any portion of this Ordinance is held to be invalid or determined to be in conflict with any law, statute or regulation by a court of competent jurisdiction, said portion shall be stricken from this Ordinance and the remaining portions of this Ordinance shall continue in full force and effect to the fullest extent possible. All codes, provisions, ordinances, resolutions and orders, or parts thereof, in conflict herewith are, to the extent of such conflict, hereby superseded. This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after the date of its passage, approval and publication in pamphlet form as provided by law.



ORDINANCE NUMBER 14 – 012

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER 18 “BUSINESSES AND BUSINESS REGULATIONS” OF THE MUNICIPAL CODE OF THE VILLAGE OF SAUK VILLAGE, ILLINOIS ESTABLISHING AN AUTOMATED RENTAL MACHINE LICENSE

WHEREAS, the Village of Sauk Village, Cook and Will Counties, Illinois (the “Village”) is a duly organized and existing municipal corporation created under the provisions of the laws of the State of Illinois and under the provisions of the Illinois Municipal Code, as from time to time supplemented and amended; and

WHEREAS, the President and Board of Trustees of the Village of Sauk Village (the “Corporate Authorities”) may from time to time amend the text of the Municipal Code of the Village when it is determined to be in the best interests of the Village; and

WHEREAS, the Corporate Authorities find that automated rental machines, such as “Redbox” DVD rental machines, are being located throughout the Village and are unattended and not adequately monitored or maintained; and

WHEREAS, the Corporate Authorities find that restricting the placement and number of automated rental machines in the Village will minimize the detrimental effects of such unattended machines on citizens, especially unaccompanied minors in the Village and aid in the prevention of incidence of juvenile crime; and

WHEREAS, the Corporate Authorities have determined that it is in the best interests of the health, safety and welfare of residents of the Village to prohibit the unregulated growth of automated rental machines in the Village and establish regulations and restrictions for the use of automated rental machines to further an important public interest.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE PRESIDENT AND BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE VILLAGE OF SAUK VILLAGE, COOK AND WILL COUNTIES, AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION ONE: That the above recitals are found to be true and correct and are hereby incorporated herein and made a part hereof, as if fully set forth in its entirety.

SECTION TWO: Chapter 18 “Businesses and Business Regulations” of the Municipal Code of the Village of Sauk Village is hereby amended by adding the following new Article to read, as follows.

Article XVIII Automated Rental Machines

Section 18-1047 Definitions.

The term “Automated Rental Machine” shall mean any machine which accepts coin, paper money or other remuneration that is intended for use as a vending machine for videos or DVD for rental at times when no employee or representative of the sponsoring company or organization is present to accept

payment.

Section 18-1048 Requirements; Maintenance.

Every requirement herein contained shall apply to any Automated Rental Machine currently situated or to be placed within the corporate boundaries of the Village.

a. The organization or company benefitting from an Automated Rental Machine or the host site on whose property an Automated Rental Machine is situated, shall indicate the following information on an Automated Rental Machine: name of organization or company, address, contact telephone number.

b. All signage on an Automated Rental Machine shall be in compliance with all requirements contained in the Municipal Code of the Village.

c. The owner of the Automated Rental Machine shall secure an electrical permit from the Building Department.

d. An Automated Rental Machine shall be painted and in good condition and appearance, with no structural damage, no holes in the machine that would allow leaks, no visible rust and free of graffiti or advertising other than the name of the host site or organization or company benefitting from an Automated Rental Machine.

Section 18-1049 License Required.

A license shall be obtained from the Village before placement of an Automated Rental Machine occurs as permitted in this article.

Section 18-1050 License Application.

Application for a license, pursuant to this section, shall be made to the Village on forms provided by the Village. In addition to the license application provisions of Article II of this Chapter, an application for the license required herein shall contain the following information:

- a) Name and address of the applicant;
- b) The specific location of the proposed Automated Rental Machine;
- c) The number and description of the Automated Rental Machine intended to be kept for use at that location.

The applicant must also provide, accompanying the application, proof of Village electrical permit, a certificate of insurance and a statement of permission to locate the Automated Rental Machine signed by the owner of the property, business owner or representative thereof, where the Automated Rental Machine will be located.

Section 18-1051 License Fee; Renewal.

The fee for said license shall be One Hundred Dollars and no/100 (\$100.00). The term of the license shall be for one year. The license shall be renewed on a yearly basis. At each renewal, the applicant shall provide a current certificate of insurance and a current statement of permission to locate the

Automated Rental Machine signed by the owner of the property, business owner or representative thereof, where the Automated Rental Machine will be located

Section 18-1052 Enforcement.

a. The organization or company benefitting from an Automated Rental Machine will be held primarily responsible for the maintenance, upkeep and servicing of the Automated Rental Machine. However, in the event the organization fails to adequately maintain and service the Automated Rental Machine, the business owner, or host site, on whose property the Automated Rental Machine is placed, shall also be responsible.

b. Failure to properly maintain, upkeep or service an Automated Rental Machine shall result in a fine pursuant to the penalty provision contained in this Article.

Section 18-1053 Relationship to Other Laws.

Nothing in this Article shall be deemed to limit the Village in any way to use any or all other means available to remove the nuisance, or summarily eliminate immediate hazards to the public health, safety or welfare as granted in any ordinances of the Village or the laws or Constitution of the State of Illinois.

Section 18-1054 Penalty.

Unless otherwise provided in this Article, any person, firm or corporation violating any section of this Article shall be fined not more than Two Hundred and Fifty Dollars and no/100 (\$250.00) for each offense. Each day that a violation continues shall be considered a separate offense.

SECTION THREE. If any section, paragraph, clause or provision of this Ordinance shall be held invalid, the invalidity thereof shall not affect any other provision of this Ordinance.

SECTION FOUR. Any ordinance or portion of any ordinance in conflict with any provisions of this Ordinance is hereby repealed solely to the extent of such conflict.





ORDINANCE NO. 14-013
AN ORDINANCE AMENDING SECTION 1-15
OF THE VILLAGE CODE REGARDING PENALTIES AND COLLECTIONS

WHEREAS, the Village of Sauk Village is a non-home rule municipality under the Illinois Constitution of 1970;

WHEREAS, the Village is authorized to assess fines for violations of the Municipal Code;

WHEREAS, the Village has found that a great number of people do not pay their fines which has resulted in the Village referring past due matters to collection agencies;

WHEREAS, collections agencies charge the Village a fee for their services;

WHEREAS, the Village desires to pass the fees of the collections agencies on to the person who is responsible for paying the fine or penalties;

WHEREAS, it is in the best interests of the Village to pass the fee of the collection agency on to the individuals.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE Mayor and Board of Trustees of the Village of Sauk Village, Cook and Will Counties, Illinois in the exercise of its non-home rule powers as follows:

Section 1: The above stated recitals are incorporated herein by reference.

Section 2: Section 1-15 (General Penalty) of the Village Code is hereby amended by adding the following subsection e:

Sec. 1-15. General Penalty.

(e) Whenever any fine, charge, penalty or payment is due pursuant to any provision in this Code and is not paid after the village sends, mails or otherwise delivers notice (unless a different period is stated elsewhere in this Code) to the person responsible for such fine, charge, penalty or

payment (the “Responsible Person”), the village may transfer such fine, charge, penalty or payment to a collection agency of the village’s choosing. Any such collection agency shall, for purposes of collection of such fine, charge, penalty or payment, be deemed an agent of the village. All costs incurred by the village for the collection of any fines, charges, penalties or payments transferred to any such collection agency shall be assessed against the Responsible Person as an additional fine, charge, penalty or payment, subject to any applicable statutory limits.

Section 3: If any part of this Ordinance is found and determined to be invalid, the invalid portion shall be stricken herefrom and the remainder shall be in full force and effect.

Section 4: All ordinances in conflict with the terms of this Ordinance are hereby repealed to the extent of such conflict.


Section 5: This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage and approval.



WHEREAS, the President and the Board of Trustees of the Village of Sauk Village (the “*Corporate Authorities*”) have heretofore exercised the power conferred on them pursuant to Chapter 11-13-1, *et seq.*, of the Illinois Municipal Code by adopting the Sauk Village Zoning Ordinance, as amended from time to time; and

WHEREAS, an amendment application has been submitted by the Village requesting amendment to Article IV “Zoning Applications and Approvals,” by adding Subsection 82-105, “Adult Use Moratorium” (the “*Proposed Amendment*”); and

WHEREAS, the Zoning Board of Appeals/Plan Commission held a public hearing on March 24, 2014 on whether the Proposed Amendment should be approved, at which time all persons present were afforded an opportunity to be heard; and

WHEREAS, a public notice in the form required by law was given of said March 24, 2014 public hearing date by publication not more than thirty (30) days nor less than fifteen (15) days prior to said public hearing date in the Southtown Star, a newspaper of general circulation published in this Village; and

WHEREAS, the Zoning Board of Appeals/Plan Commission has filed its findings of fact and recommendations that the Proposed Amendment to the Sauk Village Zoning Ordinance be granted, and the Corporate Authorities have duly considered said findings of fact and recommendations; and

WHEREAS, studies conducted by various communities, including New York City, New York; Los Angeles, California; Phoenix, Arizona; and Tuscon, Arizona have shown that adult uses have a deleterious effect on the quality of life of the communities in proximity to them, causing a downgrade in property values, increase in crime, adverse impacts on economic development, and other adverse secondary effects; and

WHEREAS, the Corporate Authorities have determined that, in order to address the aforesaid deleterious effects of adult uses, it is necessary for the Village to study the nature of those effects and the methods of regulation that will best control those secondary effects without infringing on the constitutional rights of owners and operators of adult uses; and

WHEREAS, prior to the adoption of the Village's adult use regulations, if any, it is possible that applications for building permits, certificates of occupancy, zoning applications and other permits or licenses relating to new or existing adult uses may be filed, thereby compromising the Village's efforts to address the secondary effects of such businesses; and

WHEREAS, a temporary, 180-day moratorium on acceptance of applications for, and issuance of building permits, certificates of occupancy, zoning applications and other permits or licenses relating to adult uses should provide the Village with adequate time in which to consider potential amendments to the Village's zoning ordinance relating to adult uses; and

WHEREAS, it is not the intent of the Village to suppress any speech activities protected by the First Amendment, but rather to address the secondary effects of adult uses; and

WHEREAS, reasonable alternative avenues for sexually oriented communication are available during the term of this ordinance; and

WHEREAS, the Corporate Authorities have determined, in the best interest of the health, safety and welfare of the residents of the Village, to amend the text of the Sauk Village Zoning Ordinance.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the President and Board of Trustees of the Village of Sauk Village, Cook and Will Counties, Illinois, as follows:

Section 1. The above recitals and legislative findings are found to be true and correct and are hereby incorporated herein and made a part hereof, as if fully set forth in their entirety.

Section 2. The Corporate Authorities find and determine that the adoption of the Proposed Amendment is in the public interest, and is in furtherance of the progressive demands of orderly Village development.

Section 3. Article IV “*Zoning Applications and Approvals*” of Chapter 82 “Zoning, Planning and Development”, is hereby amended by adding the following new section to read as follows:

Sec. 82-105. Adult Use Moratorium: Notwithstanding any provision of the Sauk Village Zoning Ordinance to the contrary, the Zoning Administrator, or any other authorized personnel, shall not accept applications for, or issue, zoning certificates or certificates of occupancy for adult uses, in the Village of Sauk Village.

A. Statement of Purpose: The purpose of the adult use moratorium is to limit temporarily, except as otherwise provided herein, the acceptance of applications for adult uses in anticipation of completion of an analysis of the deleterious effects of adult uses and implementation of regulations to address such effects, thereby promoting the orderly development of the

Village of Sauk Village and protecting the public health, safety and welfare of its residents. It is not the intent of this ordinance to suppress or infringe upon any speech activities protected by the First Amendment or to deny development rights protected by law.

B. Duration: The duration of this adult use moratorium shall continue in effect for one-hundred and eighty (180) days from April 8, 2014 at 11:59 p.m., or until the Village Board terminates this moratorium, whichever occurs first.

Section 4. All sections of the Sauk Village Zoning Ordinance not addressed in this Ordinance or another amending ordinance shall remain in full force and effect.

Section 5. If any section, paragraph, clause or provision of this Ordinance shall be held invalid, the invalidity thereof shall not affect any other provision of this Ordinance.

Section 6. All ordinances, resolutions, motions or orders in conflict with this Ordinance are hereby repealed to the extent of such conflict.


Section 7. This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect immediately upon its passage due to the urgent need of protecting the health, safety and welfare of the residents of the Village.



ORDINANCE NUMBER 14-015

AN ORDINANCE PROHIBITING THE PRIVATE USE OF GROUNDWATER
WITHIN MAXIMUM SETBACK ZONE AREAS

WHEREAS, the Village of Sauk Village corporate authorities recently passed Ordinance 14-003 on January 14, 2014 establishing that the well-head supply sites for Wells 1, 2, and 3 of the Village of Sauk Village Municipality should be granted the maximum area of protection permitted by the Illinois Groundwater Protection Act; and

WHEREAS, Division 4 (Minimum and Maximum Setback Zone) of Article II (Water) of Chapter 78 (Utilities) of the Village Code establishes a Maximum Setback Zone for each of the Village Well Sites and a map of the maximum setback zones is provided in Section 78-95; and

WHEREAS, certain properties within or near the Maximum Setback Zones for the Village Well Sites have been used over a period of time for commercial/industrial purposes; and

WHEREAS, because of said use, concentrations of certain chemical constituents in the groundwater beneath the Maximum Setback Zones may exceed Class I groundwater quality standards for potable resource groundwater as set forth in 35 Illinois Administrative Code 620 or Tier 1 remediation objectives as set forth in 35 Illinois Administrative Code 742; and

WHEREAS, the Village of Sauk Village desires to limit potential threats to human health from groundwater contamination while facilitating the redevelopment and productive use of properties that are the source of said chemical constituents;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE VILLAGE OF SAUK VILLAGE , ILLINOIS:

Section One. That the above recital is found to be true and correct and is hereby incorporated herein and made a part hereof, as if fully set forth in its entirety.

Section Two. Section 78-91 of Division 4 (Minimum and Maximum Setback Zone) of Article II (Water) of Chapter 78 (Utilities) of the Municipal Code of the Village of Sauk Village is hereby amended by adding the following language:

Section 78-91. Definitions

"Potable Water" is any water used for human or domestic consumption, including, but not limited to, water used for drinking, bathing, swimming, washing dishes, or preparing foods.

Section Three. Section 78-96 is hereby added to Division 4 (Minimum and Maximum Setback Zone) of Article II (Water) of Chapter 78 (Utilities) of the Municipal Code of the Village of Sauk Village and shall provide the following new sections:

Section 78-96. Private use of groundwater as a potable water supply prohibited.

Except for such uses or methods in existence before the effective date of this ordinance, the use or attempted use of groundwater from within the Maximum Setback Zone areas for Village Well Sites 1, 2 and 3 as a Potable Water supply by the installation or drilling of wells or by any other method is hereby prohibited. This prohibition does not include the use of groundwater by the Village of Sauk Village and any use required as part of an U.S. EPA or Illinois EPA approved response activity.

Section Four. Repealer.

All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with this ordinance are hereby repealed insofar as they are in conflict with this ordinance.

Section Five. Severability.

If any provision of this ordinance or its application to any person or under any circumstances is adjudged invalid, such adjudication shall not affect the validity of the ordinance as a whole or of any portion not adjudged invalid.

Section Six. Effective date.



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

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the Mayor and Board of Trustees of the Village of Sauk Village, Cook and Will Counties, Illinois, as follows:

Section 1. The preambles to this Ordinance are found to be true and correct and are hereby incorporated into the terms of this Ordinance as if fully set forth herein. This Ordinance is adopted pursuant to the authority granted to the Village by the Constitution of the State of Illinois and the Illinois Compiled Statutes. All applicable provisions of the Illinois Compiled Statutes,

including the Illinois Municipal Code, as may be amended from time to time, relating to the purpose of this Ordinance are hereby incorporated herein by this reference.

The headings of the articles, sections, paragraphs and subparagraphs of this Ordinance are inserted solely for the convenience of reference and form no substantive part of this Ordinance nor should they be used in any interpretation or construction of any substantive provision of this Ordinance. This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after the date of its passage, approval and publication in pamphlet form as provided by law. The provisions of this Ordinance are hereby declared to be severable. If any portion of this Ordinance is held to be invalid or determined to be in conflict with any law, statute or regulation by a court of competent jurisdiction, that portion shall be stricken from this Ordinance and the remaining portions of this Ordinance shall continue in full force and effect to the fullest extent possible. All codes, provisions, ordinances, resolutions and orders or parts thereof, in conflict herewith, are, to the extent of such conflict, hereby superseded.



ORDINANCE NO. 14-017

AN ORDINANCE ADOPTING PREVAILING WAGE STANDARDS

WHEREAS, the State of Illinois has enacted the "Prevailing Wage Act," 820 ILCS 130/1 et seq. (the "Act"); and

WHEREAS, the Act requires that the VILLAGE OF SAUK VILLAGE investigate and ascertain the prevailing rate of wages as defined in the Act for laborers, mechanics and other workers in the locality of the District employed in performing construction of public works for the District.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE PRESIDENT AND BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE VILLAGE OF SAUK VILLAGE:

Section 1. To the extent and as required by the Prevailing Wage Act, the general prevailing rates of wages engaged in construction of public works coming under the jurisdiction of the VILLAGE OF SAUK VILLAGE is hereby ascertained to be the same as the prevailing rate of wages for construction work in Cook and Will Counties as determined by the Department of Labor of the State of Illinois as of June of the current year. A copy of said determination is attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference.

As required by the Act, any and all revisions of the prevailing rate of wages by the Department of Labor of the State of Illinois shall supersede the Department's June determination and apply to any and all public works construction undertaken by the VILLAGE OF SAUK VILLAGE. The definition of any terms appearing in this ordinance which are used in the Act shall be the same as in the Act.

Section 2. Nothing herein contained shall be construed to apply said general prevailing rate of wages as herein ascertained to any work or employment, except public works

construction of the VILLAGE OF SAUK VILLAGE to extent required by the Act.

Section 3. The President or Village Clerk of the VILLAGE OF SAUK VILLAGE shall publicly post or keep available for inspection by any interested party in the main office of the Village this determination or any revisions of such prevailing rate of wage. A copy of this determination or of the current revised determination of the prevailing rate of wage then in effect, shall be attached to all contract specifications.

Section 4. The President or Village Clerk of the VILLAGE OF SAUK VILLAGE shall mail a copy of this determination to any employer and to any association of employers, and to any person or association of employees who have filed their names and addresses requesting copies of any determination, stating the particular rates and the particular class of workers whose wages will be affected by such rates.


Section 5. The President or Village Clerk of the VILLAGE OF SAUK VILLAGE shall promptly file a certified copy of this Ordinance with both the Secretary of State of Illinois, Index Division, 111 East Monroe Street, Springfield, IL 62706 and the Illinois Department of Labor, Prevailing Wage Division, 900 S. Spring Street, Springfield, IL 62704.

Section 6. Within thirty days after filing with the Secretary of State, the President or Village Clerk of the VILLAGE OF SAUK VILLAGE shall cause to be published in a newspaper of general circulation within the area, a notice of passage of this Ordinance. Such publication shall constitute notice that the determination is effective, and that this is the determination of this public body.



COOK COUNTY

The following list is considered as those days for which holiday rates of wages for work performed apply: New Years Day, Memorial Day, Fourth of July, Labor Day, Thanksgiving Day, Christmas Day and Veterans Day in some classifications/counties. Generally, any of these holidays which fall on a Sunday is celebrated on the following Monday. This then makes work performed on that Monday payable at the appropriate overtime rate for holiday pay. Common practice in a given local may alter certain days of celebration. If in doubt, please check with IDOL.

TRUCK DRIVERS (WEST) - That part of the county West of Barrington Road.

EXPLANATION OF CLASSES

ASBESTOS - GENERAL - removal of asbestos material/mold and hazardous materials from any place in a building, including mechanical systems where those mechanical systems are to be removed. This includes the removal of asbestos materials/mold and hazardous materials from ductwork or pipes in a building when the building is to be demolished at the time or at some close future date.

ASBESTOS - MECHANICAL - removal of asbestos material from mechanical systems, such as pipes, ducts, and boilers, where the mechanical systems are to remain.

CERAMIC TILE FINISHER

The grouting, cleaning, and polishing of all classes of tile, whether for interior or exterior purposes, all burned, glazed or unglazed products; all composition materials, granite tiles, warning detectable tiles, cement tiles, epoxy composite materials, pavers, glass, mosaics, fiberglass, and all substitute materials, for tile made in tile-like units; all mixtures in tile like form of cement, metals, and other materials that are for and intended for use as a finished floor surface, stair treads, promenade roofs, walks, walls, ceilings, swimming pools, and all other places where tile is to form a finished interior or exterior. The mixing of all setting mortars including but not limited to thin-set mortars, epoxies, wall mud, and any other sand and cement mixtures or adhesives when used in the preparation, installation, repair, or maintenance of tile and/or similar materials. The handling and unloading of all sand, cement, lime, tile, fixtures, equipment, adhesives, or any other materials to be used in

the preparation, installation, repair, or maintenance of tile and/or similar materials. Ceramic Tile Finishers shall fill all joints and voids regardless of method on all tile work, particularly and especially after installation of said tile work. Application of any and all protective coverings to all types of tile installations including, but not be limited to, all soap compounds, paper products, tapes, and all polyethylene coverings, plywood, masonite, cardboard, and any new type of products that may be used to protect tile installations, Blastrac equipment, and all floor scarifying equipment used in preparing floors to receive tile. The clean up and removal of all waste and materials. All demolition of existing tile floors and walls to be re-tiled.

COMMUNICATIONS ELECTRICIAN

Installation, operation, inspection, maintenance, repair and service of radio, television, recording, voice sound vision production and reproduction, telephone and telephone interconnect, facsimile, data apparatus, coaxial, fibre optic and wireless equipment, appliances and systems used for the transmission and reception of signals of any nature, business, domestic, commercial, education, entertainment, and residential purposes, including but not limited to, communication and telephone, electronic and sound equipment, fibre optic and data communication systems, and the performance of any task directly related to such installation or service whether at new or existing sites, such tasks to include the placing of wire and cable and electrical power conduit or other raceway work within the equipment room and pulling wire and/or cable through conduit and the installation of any incidental conduit, such that the employees covered hereby can complete any job in full.

MARBLE FINISHER

Loading and unloading trucks, distribution of all materials (all stone, sand, etc.), stocking of floors with material, performing all rigging for heavy work, the handling of all material that may be needed for the installation of such materials, building of scaffolding, polishing if needed, patching, waxing of material if damaged, pointing up, caulking, grouting and cleaning of marble, holding water on diamond or Carborundum blade or saw for setters cutting, use of tub saw or any other saw needed for preparation of material, drilling of holes for wires that anchor material set by setters, mixing up of molding plaster for installation of material, mixing up thin set for the installation of material, mixing up of sand to cement for the installation of material and such other work as may be required in helping a Marble Setter in the handling of all material in the erection or installation of interior marble, slate, travertine, art marble, serpentine, alberene stone, blue stone, granite and other stones (meaning as to stone any foreign or domestic materials as are specified and used in building interiors and exteriors and customarily known as stone in the trade), carrara, sanionyx, vitrolite and similar opaque glass and the laying of all marble tile, terrazzo tile, slate tile and precast tile, steps, risers

treads, base, or any other materials that may be used as substitutes for any of the aforementioned materials and which are used on interior and exterior which are installed in a similar manner.

MATERIAL TESTER I: Hand coring and drilling for testing of materials; field inspection of uncured concrete and asphalt.

MATERIAL TESTER II: Field inspection of welds, structural steel, fireproofing, masonry, soil, facade, reinforcing steel, formwork, cured concrete, and concrete and asphalt batch plants; adjusting proportions of bituminous mixtures.

TRAFFIC SAFETY

Work associated with barricades, horses and drums used to reduce lane usage on highway work, the installation and removal of temporary lane markings, and the installation and removal of temporary road signs.

TRUCK DRIVER - BUILDING, HEAVY AND HIGHWAY CONSTRUCTION - EAST & WEST

Class 1. Two or three Axle Trucks. Other Classifications of Work:

For definitions of classifications not otherwise set out, the Department generally has on file such definitions which are available. If a task to be performed is not subject to one of the classifications of pay set out, the Department will upon being contacted state which neighboring county has such a classification and provide such rate, such rate being deemed to exist by reference in this document. If no neighboring county rate applies to the task, the Department shall undertake a special determination, such special determination being then deemed to have existed under this determination. If a project requires these, or any classification not listed, please contact IDOL at 217-782-1710 for wage rates or clarifications.

LANDSCAPING

Landscaping work falls under the existing classifications for laborer, operating engineer and truck driver. The work performed by landscape plantsman and landscape laborer is covered by the existing classification of laborer. The work performed by landscape operators (regardless of equipment used or its size) is covered by the classifications of operating engineer. The work performed by landscape truck drivers (regardless of size of truck driven) is covered by the classifications of truck driver.

MATERIAL TESTER & MATERIAL TESTER/INSPECTOR I AND II

Notwithstanding the difference in the classification title, the classification entitled "Material Tester I" involves the same job duties as the classification entitled "Material Tester/Inspector I". Likewise, the classification entitled "Material Tester II" involves the same job duties as the classification entitled "Material Tester/Inspector II".

WILL COUNTY

The following list is considered as those days for which holiday rates of wages for work performed apply: New Years Day, Memorial Day, Fourth of July, Labor Day, Thanksgiving Day, Christmas Day and Veterans Day in some classifications/counties. Generally, any of these holidays which fall on a Sunday is celebrated on the following Monday. This then makes work performed on that Monday payable at the appropriate overtime rate for holiday pay. Common practice in a given local may alter certain days of celebration. If in doubt, please check with IDOL.

EXPLANATION OF CLASSES

ASBESTOS - GENERAL - removal of asbestos material/mold and hazardous materials from any place in a building, including mechanical systems where those mechanical systems are to be removed. This includes the removal of asbestos materials/mold and hazardous materials from ductwork or pipes in a building when the building is to be demolished at the time or at some close future date.

ASBESTOS - MECHANICAL - removal of asbestos material from mechanical systems, such as pipes, ducts, and boilers, where the mechanical systems are to remain.

CERAMIC TILE FINISHER

The grouting, cleaning, and polishing of all classes of tile, whether for interior or exterior purposes, all burned, glazed or unglazed products; all composition materials, granite tiles, warning detectable tiles, cement tiles, epoxy composite materials, pavers, glass, mosaics, fiberglass, and all substitute materials, for tile made in tile-like units; all mixtures in tile like form of cement, metals, and other materials that are for and intended for use as a finished floor surface, stair treads, promenade roofs, walks, walls, ceilings, swimming pools, and all other places where tile is to form a finished interior or exterior. The mixing of all setting mortars including but not limited to thin-set mortars, epoxies, wall mud, and any other sand and cement mixtures or adhesives when used in the preparation, installation, repair, or maintenance of tile and/or similar materials. The handling and unloading of all sand, cement, lime, tile, fixtures, equipment, adhesives, or any other materials to be used in the preparation, installation, repair, or maintenance of tile and/or similar materials. Ceramic Tile Finishers shall fill all joints and voids regardless of method on all tile work, particularly and especially after installation of said tile work. Application of any and all protective coverings to all types of tile installations including, but not be limited to, all soap compounds, paper products, tapes, and all polyethylene coverings, plywood, masonite, cardboard, and any new type of products that may be used to protect tile

installations, Blastrac equipment, and all floor scarifying equipment used in preparing floors to receive tile. The clean up and removal of all waste and materials. All demolition of existing tile floors and walls to be re-tiled.

COMMUNICATIONS TECHNICIAN

Installation, operation, inspection, maintenance, repair and service of radio, television, recording, voice, sound and vision production and reproduction, telephone and telephone interconnect, facsimile, equipment and appliances used for domestic, commercial, educational and entertainment purposes, pulling of wire through conduit but not the installation of conduit.

MARBLE FINISHER

Loading and unloading trucks, distribution of all materials (all stone, sand, etc.), stocking of floors with material, performing all rigging for heavy work, the handling of all material that may be needed for the installation of such materials, building of scaffolding, polishing if needed, patching, waxing of material if damaged, pointing up, caulking, grouting and cleaning of marble, holding water on diamond or Carborundum blade or saw for setters cutting, use of tub saw or any other saw needed for preparation of material, drilling of holes for wires that anchor material set by setters, mixing up of molding plaster for installation of material, mixing up thin set for the installation of material, mixing up of sand to cement for the installation of material and such other work as may be required in helping a Marble Setter in the handling of all material in the erection or installation of interior marble, slate, travertine, art marble, serpentine, alberene stone, blue stone, granite and other stones (meaning as to stone any foreign or domestic materials as are specified and used in building interiors and exteriors and customarily known as stone in the trade), carrara, sanionyx, vitrolite and similar opaque glass and the laying of all marble tile, terrazzo tile, slate tile and precast tile, steps, risers treads, base, or any other materials that may be used as substitutes for any of the aforementioned materials and which are used on interior and exterior which are installed in a similar manner.

MATERIAL TESTER I: Hand coring and drilling for testing of materials; field inspection of uncured concrete and asphalt.

MATERIAL TESTER II: Field inspection of welds, structural steel, fireproofing, masonry, soil, facade, reinforcing steel, formwork, cured concrete, and concrete and asphalt batch plants; adjusting proportions of bituminous mixtures.

The handling of sand, cement, marble chips, and all other materials that may be used by the Mosaic Terrazzo Mechanic, and the mixing, grinding, grouting, cleaning and sealing of all Marble, Mosaic, and Terrazzo work, floors, base, stairs, and wainscoting by hand or machine, and in addition, assisting and aiding Marble, Masonic, and Terrazzo Mechanics.

Other Classifications of Work:

For definitions of classifications not otherwise set out, the Department generally has on file such definitions which are available. If a task to be performed is not subject to one of the classifications of pay set out, the Department will upon being contacted state which neighboring county has such a classification and provide such rate, such rate being deemed to exist by reference in this document. If no neighboring county rate applies to the task, the Department shall undertake a special determination, such special determination being then deemed to have existed under this determination. If a project requires these, or any classification not listed, please contact IDOL at 217-782-1710 for wage rates or clarifications.

LANDSCAPING

Landscaping work falls under the existing classifications for laborer,

operating engineer and truck driver. The work performed by landscape plantsman and landscape laborer is covered by the existing classification of laborer. The work performed by landscape operators (regardless of equipment used or its size) is covered by the classifications of operating engineer. The work performed by landscape truck drivers (regardless of size of truck driven) is covered by the classifications of truck driver.

MATERIAL TESTER & MATERIAL TESTER/INSPECTOR I AND II

Notwithstanding the difference in the classification title, the classification entitled "Material Tester I" involves the same job duties as the classification entitled "Material Tester/Inspector I". Likewise, the classification entitled "Material Tester II" involves the same job duties as the classification entitled "Material Tester/Inspector II".

AN ORDINANCE GRANTING A VARIANCE FOR THE PROPERTY COMMONLY

ILLINOIS (SIGN VARIANCE)

WHEREAS, the Village of Sauk Village, Cook and Will Counties, Illinois, is a non-home rule municipality pursuant to the Illinois Constitution; and

WHEREAS, the President and the Board of Trustees of the Village of Sauk Village (the “*Corporate Authorities*”) have heretofore exercised the power conferred on them pursuant to Chapter 11-31-1, et seq., of the Illinois Municipal Code by adopting the 2008 United Development Code of the Village of Sauk Village (the “*Zoning Code*”); and

WHEREAS, a variance application has been submitted to the Village by Site Enhancement Services on behalf of Advanced Auto Parts (the “*Applicant*”) to allow a second freestanding sign on the property (the “*Proposed Variance*”) on the property commonly known as 17-21 Sauk Plaza/6810 Euclid, Sauk Village, Illinois, and as legally described below (the “*Property*”); and

WHEREAS, said application has been referred to the Zoning Board of Appeals/Plan Commission (the “*Board*”) and has been processed in accordance with the Zoning Code, as amended; and

WHEREAS, the Board held a public hearing on June 16, 2014, on whether the requested Proposed Variance should be granted, at which time all persons present were afforded an opportunity to be heard; and

WHEREAS, public notice, in the form required by law, was given of said June 16, 2014 public hearing date by publication not more than thirty (30) days nor less than fifteen (15) days prior to said public hearing date in the Southtown Star, a newspaper of general circulation published in this Village; and

WHEREAS, the Village of Sauk Village, Counties of Cook and Will, State of Illinois (the “Village”) is a duly organized and existing village and unit of local government created under the provisions of the laws of the State of Illinois, and is operating the provisions of the Illinois Municipal Code, as supplemented and amended, with the full power to enact ordinances and adopt resolutions for the benefit of its residents; and

WHEREAS, the Village is a municipality operating under the annual appropriation system pursuant to Section 8-2-9 of the Illinois Municipal Code (65 ILCS 5/8-2-9); and

WHEREAS, Section 8-2-9 of the Illinois Municipal Code (65 ILCS 5/8-2-9) requires a municipality with less than five hundred thousand (500,000) inhabitants to adopt and pass an ordinance appropriating such sums of money as are deemed necessary to defray all necessary expenses and liabilities of the municipality and which specifies the objects and purposes for which these appropriations are made and the amount appropriated for each object or purpose; and

WHEREAS, the annual appropriation for the 05/01/2014-04/30/2015 fiscal year (FY 2014-15) (or a formally prepared appropriation document upon which this Ordinance is based) has been and currently is conveniently available for public inspection in the Village of Sauk Village Municipal Center, the office of the Village Treasurer, the office of the Village Clerk, at the Village’s customer services desk and at the Nancy L. McConathy Public Library as required by law; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees of the Village (the “Village Board”) and the Village Mayor, (the “Mayor” and with the Village Board, the “Corporate Authorities”) have held all hearings and caused all notices and publications to be posted and published in accordance with the laws of the State of Illinois; and

WHEREAS, the Corporate Authorities have reviewed the annual appropriation ordinance for FY 2014-15 (the 2014-15 Annual Appropriation Ordinance”) and have determined that said appropriations are in the best interest of the Village and the residents of the Village.

The various objects and purposes for which said appropriations are herein made are set forth as follows:

SECTION 3: If any section, paragraph, clause or provision of this Ordinance shall be held invalid, the invalidity thereof shall not affect any other provision of this Ordinance.

SECTION 4: Any ordinance or portion of any ordinance in conflict with any provisions of this Ordinance is hereby repealed solely to the extent of such conflict.







MUTUAL AID BOX ALARM SYSTEM FIRST ADDENDUM TO MABAS MASTER AGREEMENT

This First Addendum to the Mutual Aid Box Alarm System ("MABAS") Master Agreement in the State of Illinois, last amended prior to 2000, is meant to incorporate in its entirety the terms included within the Master Agreement except as specifically changed herein. In the event there is a conflict between the terms and conditions of the Master Agreement and this Addendum, this Addendum shall be controlling.

As the cost of lending mutual aid support has increased in recent times, communities have determined it necessary to agree in advance on cost reimbursement issues prior to the occurrence of an actual emergency. Mutual aid agreements such as the MABAS Master Agreement have served as the foundation for navigating cost issues and engaging in these agreements prior to the emergency avoid post-emergency concerns on cost reimbursement.

SECTION FIVE – Compensation for Aid is amended to read as follows:

Equipment, personnel, and/or services provided to this Agreement shall be at no charge to the party requesting aid for the first eight (8) consecutive hours of aid provided to the Stricken Unit; however, any expenses recoverable from third parties shall be equitably distributed among responding parties. Day to day mutual aid should remain free of charge and the administrative requirements of reimbursement make it unfeasible to charge for day-to-day mutual aid. Nothing herein shall operate to bar any recovery of funds from any state or federal agency under any existing statute.

Any Aiding Unit is empowered to and may charge a Stricken Unit for reimbursement for costs of equipment, personnel, and/or services provided under this Agreement for terms of more than eight (8) consecutive hours under the following terms and conditions:

1. The amount of charges assessed by an Aiding Unit to a Stricken Unit may not exceed the amount necessary to make the Aiding Unit whole and should only include costs that are non-routine in nature.
2. The Aiding Unit must assess no more the "usual and customary" charges for personnel costs pursuant to a collective bargaining agreement, benefit ordinance or compensation policy.

3. The fee structure for apparatus and equipment shall be based on FEMA or OSFM rate schedules. If a particular piece of apparatus or equipment is not listed within the FEMA / OSFM rate schedules, a market rate for reimbursement shall be established.
4. In no event shall the amount assessed by an Aiding Unit to a Stricken Unit exceed the amount of fees permitted to be assessed under Illinois law.
5. Aiding Units must invoice the Stricken Unit within thirty (30) days after the completion of the emergency. Once thirty (30) days pass, the aid shall be considered to be a donation of service.
6. Mutual Aid and assessing costs for mutual aid cannot in any way be conditioned upon any declaration of a federal disaster.

Member Units are encouraged to consider the adoption of internal policies establishing procedures for cost reimbursement on MABAS mobilizations pursuant to established MABAS procedures for collection and submission of funds.



WHEREAS, the Constitution of the State of Illinois, 1970, Article VII, Section 10, authorizes units of local government to contract or otherwise associate among themselves in any manner not prohibited by law or ordinance; and,

WHEREAS, the "Intergovernmental Cooperation Act", 5 ILCS 220/1 et seq., provides that any power or powers, privileges or authority exercised or which may be exercised by a unit of local government may be exercised and enjoyed jointly with any other unit of local government; and,

WHEREAS, Section 5 of the "Intergovernmental Cooperation Act", 5 ILCS 220/5, provides that any one or more public agencies may contract with any one or more public agencies to perform any governmental service, activity or undertaking which any of the public agencies entering into the contract is authorized by law to perform, provided that such contract shall be authorized by the governing body of each party to the contract; and,

WHEREAS, the parties hereto are units of local government as defined by the Constitution of the State of Illinois, 1970, Article VII, Section 10, and the Intergovernmental Cooperation Act; and,

WHEREAS, the Mayor/President and the Council/Board of Trustees of the Village of SAUK Village have determined that it is in the best interests of this unit of local government and its residents to enter into an Addendum to the Mutual Aid Box Alarm System Agreement to secure to each the benefits of mutual aid in fire protection, firefighting, rescue, emergency medical services and other activities for the protection of life and property from an emergency or disaster and to provide for communications procedures, training

and other necessary functions to further the provision of said protection of life and property from an emergency or disaster.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the Mayor/President and Council/Board of the Village of Sauk Village,
Cook and Will County, Illinois as follows:





**AN ORDINANCE OF THE VILLAGE OF SAUK VILLAGE, COOK AND WILL
COUNTIES, ILLINOIS APPROVING AN INTERGOVERNMENTAL AGREEMENT
BY AND BETWEEN THE ILLINOIS OFFICE OF THE COMPTROLLER
AND THE VILLAGE OF SAUK VILLAGE REGARDING ACCESS TO THE
COMPTROLLER'S LOCAL DEBT RECOVERY PROGRAM**

WHEREAS, the Village of Sauk Village (the "*Village*") and the Illinois Office of the Comptroller (the "*IOC*") are units of local government; and

WHEREAS, Article VII, Section 10 of the Illinois Constitution authorizes units of local government to enter into contract to exercise, combine or transfer any power or function not prohibited by law; and

WHEREAS, the Intergovernmental Cooperation Act, 5 ILCS 220/1 *et seq.*, (the "*Act*") authorizes units of local government to exercise jointly with any public agency of the State, including other units of local government, any power, privilege or authority which may be exercised by a unit of local government individually, and to enter into contract for the performance of governmental services, activities or undertakings; and

WHEREAS, the IOC operates a system known as the Comptroller's Offset System (the "*System*") for collection of debt owed the State by persons receiving payments from the State; and

WHEREAS, the Illinois General Assembly specifically provided for the ability of the Village to utilize the System when it amended Section 10.05 and added Section 10.05d to the State Comptroller Act (P.A. 97-632; 15 ILCS 405/10.05 and 10.05d); and

WHEREAS, the Mayor and Board of Trustees have determined that participation in the Debt Recovery Program and System pursuant to agreement will aid the governmental objectives of the Village and benefit Village residents.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the Mayor and Board of Trustee of the Village of Sauk Village, Cook and Will Counties, Illinois, by and through its Non-Home Rule Powers, as follows:

Section 1. That the above recitals are incorporated herein and made a part hereof, as if fully set forth in their entirety.

Section 2. The Intergovernmental Agreement by and between the Illinois Office of the Comptroller and the Village of Sauk Village, a copy of which is attached hereto and made a part hereof as Exhibit A, is hereby approved substantially in the form presented to this Board of Trustees, with such necessary changes as may be approved by the Mayor the execution thereof to constitute the approval by the Board of Trustees of any and all changes or revisions therein contained.

Section 3. The Mayor, Village Clerk, and Finance Director are hereby authorized and directed to execute and deliver the Intergovernmental Agreement and any and all other document necessary to implement the provisions, terms and conditions thereof, as therein described.

Section 4. If any section, paragraph, clause or provision of this Ordinance shall be held invalid, the invalidity thereof shall not affect any of the other provisions of this Ordinance.

Section 5. All ordinances, resolutions, motions or orders in conflict with this Ordinance are hereby repealed to the extent of such conflict.

ORDINANCE No. 14-025

**AN ORDINANCE AMENDING SECTION 18-29 (FEE SCHEDULE)
OF THE VILLAGE CODE**

WHEREAS, the Village of Sauk Village, Cook and Will Counties, Illinois, is a non-home rule municipality pursuant to the Illinois Constitution; and

WHEREAS, the Corporate Authorities of the Village of Sauk Village have determined that it is in the best interest of the Village and its residents that Section 18-29 (FEE SCHEDULE) of the Village Code be amended as further set forth herein.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the President and the Board of Trustees of the Village of Sauk Village, Cook and Will Counties, Illinois, as follows:

SECTION ONE. Recitals. The foregoing recitals are adopted as express findings of the Corporate Authorities of the Village of Sauk Village and are incorporated herein by specific reference.

SECTION TWO. That Subsection 18-29(b) of Section 18-29, entitled "Fee Schedule," of Chapter 18, entitled "Businesses and Business Regulations," of the Village Code, as amended, be and is hereby further amended by removing the stricken language and adding the underlined language as provided below:

Sec. 18-29. Fee schedule.

(b)

With respect to business licenses, the license fee shall include two health inspection and one fire inspection. The license fee shall not include any health reinspections thereafter and there shall be a charge of ~~\$60.00~~ \$100.00 for each health reinspection. There shall be no charge for the first fire reinspection if all deficiencies found in the initial fire inspection have been corrected before the first fire reinspection. If all deficiencies found in the initial fire inspection have not been corrected before the first fire reinspection, there shall be charge of \$25.00 for the first fire reinspection, \$40.00 for the second fire reinspection and \$60.00 for the third and each succeeding fire reinspection.

SECTION THREE. If any section, paragraph, clause or provision of this Ordinance shall be held invalid, the invalidity thereof shall not affect any other provision of this Ordinance.

SECTION FOUR. Any ordinance or portion of any ordinance in conflict with any provisions of this Ordinance is hereby repealed solely to the extent of such conflict.





ORDINANCE NUMBER 14-026

**AN ORDINANCE FOR THE ESTABLISHMENT OF AN ENTERPRISE ZONE SUBJECT
TO THE ENTERPRISE ZONE ACT OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS.**

WHEREAS, the State of Illinois Enterprise Zone Act (20 ILCS 655/1 et seq) provides for the creation of enterprise zones to encourage private sector investments in economically distressed areas throughout the State; and

WHEREAS, The Village of Beecher, The City of Chicago Heights, The Village of Crete, The Village of Ford Heights, The Village of Glenwood, The Village of Olympia Fields, The Village of Sauk Village, The Village of South Chicago Heights, The Village of Steger, The County of Cook, and the County of Will are organized and existing under the laws of that State of Illinois. Each have areas within their respective legal boundaries that are economically distressed and would benefit from private sector investments under the Enterprise Zone Act; and

WHEREAS, the aforesaid Municipalities and Counties have joined in the collective pursuit of a joint Enterprise Zone, subject to approval of their respective governing bodies; and

WHEREAS, it is determined that it is in the best interest of the citizens of the Counties and Municipalities to establish an Enterprise Zone and encourage private sector investments within said Enterprise Zone; and

WHEREAS, prior to filing of an application for approval of the designation of an Enterprise Zone under the Illinois Enterprise Zone Act, it is required that the Counties and Municipalities adopt an Ordinance designating the proposed Enterprise Zone; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE Mayor and Board of Trustees of the Village of Sauk Village, as follows:

SECTION 1: INCORPORATION BY REFERENCE

The above Recitals are incorporated herein by reference and become part of this Section as if fully stated herein.

SECTION 2: ENTERPRISE ZONE DESIGNATION

An Enterprise Zone is hereby declared and established as an Enterprise Zone pursuant to authority granted by the Illinois Enterprise Zone Act, as amended, subject to the approval by the Illinois Enterprise Zone Board and certification by the Illinois Department of Commerce and Economic Opportunity. This Enterprise Zone is hereby named and designated as the **LINCOLN & 394 CORRIDOR Enterprise Zone**.

SECTION 3: TERM

The term of the Enterprise Zone is 15 years, subject to the effective date of certification of the Enterprise Zone and the potential 10-year renewal prescribed under the Illinois Enterprise Zone Act.

SECTION 4: DESCRIPTION OF ZONE

The area of the designated Enterprise Zone is outlined in a map in **EXHIBIT A** and described in the legal description in **EXHIBIT B**, which exhibits are attached to this Ordinance and incorporated herein by reference.

SECTION 5: QUALIFICATIONS. The County and the Municipalities hereby declare and affirm that the Zone Area is qualified for designation as an Enterprise Zone in accordance with the provisions of the Act, and it is **FOUND**:

- a. The Zone Area is a contiguous area;
- b. The Zone Area comprises an area larger than one-half square miles and not more than Fifteen square miles in total area;
- c. The Zone Area is a depressed area;
- d. The Zone Area addresses a reasonable need to encompass portions of more than one (1) municipality and adjacent unincorporated areas of the County;
- e. The Zone Area exceeds the minimum requirement of meeting 3 of the 10 criteria specified in the Illinois Enterprise Act (20ILCS 655/4 (f));
- f. On the **3rd** day of **November, 2014**, a public hearing was conducted pursuant to a Notice duly published in a newspaper of general circulation, within the Zone Area, not more than 20 days nor less than 5 days before the hearing date;
- g. The Zone Area satisfies any additional criteria stated in the Illinois Enterprise Zone Act or established by the Rules of the Illinois Department of Commerce and Economic Opportunity;

All of the above stated **FINDINGS** are supported, sustained and consistent with the substantive materials contained in **EXHIBIT C**, attached here to, and incorporated herein by reference.

SECTION 6: INCENTIVES

The State of Illinois, Counties and Municipalities offer incentives designed to encourage businesses in the private sector to locate or expand within an Enterprise Zone, subject to terms, conditions, rules and legal limitations in the law:

STATE INCENTIVES

- **Sales Tax Exemption** - A 6.25 percent state sales tax exemption is permitted on building materials to be used in an Enterprise Zone. Materials must be permanently affixed to the property and must be purchased from a qualified retailer.
- **Enterprise Zone Machinery and Equipment Consumables/Pollution Control Facilities Sales Tax Exemption** - A 6.25 percent state sales tax exemption on purchases of tangible personal property to be used in the manufacturing or assembly process or in the operation of a pollution control facility within an Enterprise Zone is available. Eligibility is based on a business making an investment in an Enterprise Zone of at least \$5 million in qualified property that creates a minimum of 200 fulltime-equivalent jobs, a business investing at least \$40 million in a zone and retaining at least 2,000 jobs, or a business investing at least \$40 million in a zone which causes the retention of at least 80 percent of the jobs existing on the date it is certified to receive the exemption.
- **Enterprise Zone Utility Tax Exemption** - A state utility tax exemption on gas, electricity and the Illinois Commerce Commission's administrative charge and telecommunication excise tax is available to businesses located In Enterprise Zones. Eligible businesses must make an investment of at least \$5 million in qualified property that creates a minimum of 200 full-time equivalent jobs in Illinois, an investment of \$20 million that retains at least 1,000 full-time-equivalent jobs, or an investment of \$175 million that creates 150 full-time equivalent jobs in Illinois. The majority of the jobs created must be located In the Enterprise Zone where the investment occurs.
- **Enterprise Zone Investment Tax Credit** - A state investment tax credit of 0.5 percent is allowed a taxpayer who invests in qualified property in a Zone. Qualified property includes machinery, equipment and buildings. The credit may be carried forward for up to five years. This credit is in addition to the regular 0.5 percent Investment tax credit, which is available throughout the state, and up to 0.5 percent credit for increased employment over the previous year.
- **Contribution Deduction** - Businesses may deduct double the value of a cash or in-kind contribution to an approved project of a Designated Zone Organization from taxable income.

LOCAL INCENTIVES AND FEES

Local governments, through the assistance and coordination of the Enterprise Zone Administrators, may provide a variety of local incentives to further encourage economic growth and investment within enterprise zones. The incentives offered are determined by counties and municipalities. The following local Enterprise Zone incentives are hereby offered:

- a) Abatement or reimbursement of 50% of the municipal portion of property taxes on new improvements for industrial, commercial, or institutional properties during the first five years following the completion of these improvements. This benefit will not be applicable if the project investor is also the recipient of tax relief for this property under the terms of a tax increment finance (TIF) agreement or other substantial property tax abatement provided by a unit of local government.
- b) Waiver of 50% of initial building permit fees for industrial, commercial, or institutional projects.
- c) The Enterprise Zone will provide officials of municipalities that are signatories to the Intergovernmental Agreement, which is Attachment D to this Ordinance, with certain written documentation and materials relative to additional incentives, including public or not-for-profit financing and workforce development programs, which municipal officials may make available to the project developer, and other interested individuals. There is no representation that the available documents and materials include all incentives and programs available to the project.

The Zone Administrator shall file a copy of the Enterprise Zone's fee schedule with the Department of Commerce and Economic Opportunity by April 1 of each year. The Zone Administrator may charge up to 0.5% (one half of one percent) of the cost of building materials of the project associated with the Enterprise Zone, provided that a maximum fee of no more than \$50,000 is permitted (20 ILCS 655/8.2 (c)).

SECTION 7. ZONE ADMINISTRATOR:

The Zone Administrator is responsible for the day-to-day operation of the Enterprise Zone including the following duties:

- (a) Supervise the implementation of the provisions of this Intergovernmental Agreement and the Illinois Enterprise Zone Act.
- (b) Act as a liaison between the Counties, Municipalities, the Illinois Department of Commerce Economic Opportunity, Designated Zone Organizations, and other State, Federal and local agencies, whether public or private.

- (c) Conduct an ongoing evaluation of the Enterprise Zone Programs and submit evaluative reports at least annually to the Council.
- (d) Promote the coordination of other relevant programs, including, but not limited to, housing, community and economic development, small business, financial assistance and employment training within the Enterprise Zone.
- (e) Recommend qualified Designated Zone Organizations to the Enterprise Zone Governing Council (the Council).
- (f) Have other such duties as specified by the Council, including the appointment of authorized personnel as appropriate, to assure the smooth operation of the Enterprise Zone.

SECTION 8: INTERGOVERNMENTAL AGREEMENT

The Enterprise Zone shall be governed, managed and operated in accordance with the Intergovernmental Agreement between the Counties and Municipalities as set forth in **EXHIBIT D**, which is attached hereto and incorporated into this Ordinance, by reference. The attached Intergovernmental Agreement (**EXHIBIT D**) was presented to the legislative body of the Village of Sauk Village and its attorney for review. The Mayor is hereby directed to execute this Agreement, on behalf of the Village of Sauk Village. Further, the Mayor or his or her designee is directed to sign all documents reasonably necessary in the furtherance of the Joint Application for said Enterprise Zone, to be filed with the Illinois Department of Commerce and Economic Opportunity.

SECTION 9: SEVERABILITY

This Ordinance and every provision thereof shall be considered severable and the invalidity of any section clause, paragraph, sentence or provision of this Ordinance will not affect the validity of any other portion of this Ordinance.



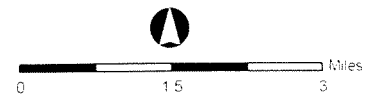
Attachment A Lincoln-394 Enterprise Zone Map

EXHIBIT C
FINDINGS REGARDING QUALIFICATION OF THE
LINCOLN & 394 CORRIDOR ENTERPRISE ZONE
UNDER THE ILLINOIS ENTERPRISE ZONE ACT

The Lincoln & 394 Corridor Enterprise Zone (the Zone) meets the criteria established under Sections 4 and 5 of the Illinois Enterprise Zone Act (the Act) in that the Zone Area:

- a. Is a contiguous area consisting of blocks of real estate parcels in the participating municipalities or unincorporated areas of Cook County or Will County which are adjacent or in some cases joined by land connections, i.e., public highways, in keeping with the common practice of Illinois Enterprise Zones, as demonstrated by the map and legal description provided in Exhibits A and B.
- b. Comprises an area larger than one half square mile and less than 15 square miles, while being located within the jurisdiction of more than 4 municipalities or counties, again as demonstrated by the map and legal description provided in Exhibits A and B.
- c. Is a depressed area as demonstrated by the area's compliance with the requirements of criteria for an Illinois Enterprise Zone discussed in point "e." below.
- d. Addresses a reasonable need to encompass portions of more than one municipality and adjacent unincorporated areas of two counties in that the Zone incorporates neighboring industrial and commercial districts that face common impediments to development and assets for sustainable redevelopment, indicating a need and opportunity for a coordinated redevelopment strategy. Common impediments include fragmented land ownership, vacant and deteriorated properties which are often brownfields, and limited local resources to encourage development. Common assets for development include excellent access to multiple modes of freight transportation and worker commute options, a base of existing resilient businesses that are interested in growth, and an under-employed workforce served by a strong network of training institutions.
- e. The Zone exceeds the minimum requirement of meeting 3 of the 10 criteria specified in the Act:

Unemployment (Criterion 1 of the Enterprise Zone application)

By the State's criterion, large parts of a Zone's Local Labor Market Area (LLMA) must have an unemployment rate higher than 120% of the State's average annual unemployment rate of 9.2% during the most recent calendar or fiscal year.

Per the Illinois Department of Employment Security, in 2013 the Zone as a whole had an average unemployment rate of 12.13%, which exceeded the State's average annual unemployment rate by

131.85%. The average annual unemployment rate was higher than 120% of the State's rate in 35 of the LLMA's 63 census tracts.

Poverty (Criterion 3 of the Enterprise Zone application)

By the State's criterion: All or part of a Zone's Local Labor Market Area (LLMA) must have a poverty rate of at least 20%; or more than 50% of children in the LLMA must be eligible to participate in the federal free or reduced-price meals program.

Per the most recent US Census data (the American Community Survey, 2012 Five-Year Data) 37% of the census tracts in this Zone's LLMA had a poverty rate higher than 20% of the population. Also 64.0% of children in this LLMA were eligible to participate in the federal free or reduced-price meals program (per the Illinois State Board of Education's 2012-13 Report).

Large Scale Business Closings (Criterion 5 of the Enterprise Zone application)

By the State's criterion: A Zone's Local Labor Market Area (LLMA) must have plant or federal facilities closures or downsizings in the 5 years prior to the date of application affecting more than 50 workers. Such closures or downsizings must be recorded in records of the Illinois Worker Adjustment and Retraining Notification (WARN) Act or the State Facilities Closure Act.

From 2009 through 2013 this Zone's LLMA experienced 11 closings that met the State's criterion, affecting a total of over 700 workers.

Career Skills Programs (Criterion 9 of the Enterprise Zone application)

By the State's criterion: A Zone must provide documentation that more than one high school or community college within its Local Labor Market Area (LLMA) provides ACT Work Keys training, Manufacturing Skills Certification training, or industry-based credentials that prepare students for careers.

This Zone's consulting team has documented cases in high schools or community colleges within the zone in which 14 institutions are providing ACT Work Keys training and 4 are providing training leading to manufacturing\industrial skill credentials.

Additional Criteria

This Zone's consulting team and participating municipalities are conducting research and analysis which is documenting that the Zone meets additional State criteria for eligibility and for high ratings within the State's application scoring system.

- f. **Public Hearing: On the 3rd day of November, 2014**, a public hearing was conducted regarding the Will-Cook Enterprise Zone. A notice was circulated by participating towns and published in the South Town Star, a newspaper of general circulation within the Zone Area during a period that was not more than 20 days or less than 5 days before the hearing date. Materials regarding this hearing

including the published notice, agenda, list of attendees, and a transcript prepared by a professional court reporter are available upon request.

EXHIBIT D

AN INTERGOVERNMENTAL AGREEMENT

BETWEEN

The Village of Beecher, The City of Chicago Heights, The Village of Crete, The Village of Ford Heights, The Village of Glenwood, The Village of Olympia Fields, The Village of Sauk Village, The Village of South Chicago Heights, The Village of Steger, The County of Cook, and the County of Will.

WHEREAS, the aforesaid Villages and Cities are Municipalities organized and existing under the laws of the State of Illinois (the "Municipalities") and the Counties of Cook and Will (the "Counties") are bodies politic and corporate organized and existing under the State of Illinois Constitution and Statutes of the State; and

WHEREAS, the State of Illinois Enterprise Zone Act (20 ILCS 655/1 et seq) provides for the creation of enterprise zones to encourage private sector investments in economically distressed areas throughout the State; and

WHEREAS, The Parties have areas, within their respective legal boundaries, that are economically distressed and would benefit from private sector investments under the Enterprise Zone Act; and

WHEREAS, it is determined that it is in the best interest of the citizens of the Municipalities and Counties to establish an Enterprise Zone and encourage private sector investments within said Enterprise Zone; and

WHEREAS, the aforesaid Municipalities and Counties have joined in the collective pursuit of the creation of an Enterprise Zone, by approval of their respective governing bodies; and

WHEREAS, the Illinois Intergovernmental Cooperation Act, 5ILCS, Section 220/1 et seq, authorizes counties and municipalities to exercise jointly with any public agency of the State, including other units of local government, any power, privilege, or authority which may be exercised by a unit of local government individually, and to enter into contracts for the performance of governmental services, activities, and undertakings; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Article 7, Section 10 of the 1970 Constitution of the State of Illinois, Counties and Municipalities are empowered to contract for the purposes set forth therein; and

WHEREAS, the Municipalities and Counties have declared and established an Enterprise Zone pursuant to the authority granted by the Illinois Enterprise Zone Act, as amended, subject to the approval by the Illinois Enterprise Zone Board and certification by the Illinois Department of Commerce and Economic Opportunity. This Enterprise Zone is named and designated as the "Lincoln and 394 Corridor Enterprise Zone"; and

WHEREAS, the term of the Enterprise Zone is 15 years, subject to the effective date of January 1 of the first calendar year after certification by the Department of Commerce and Economic Opportunity and the potential 10-year renewal enumerated in the Illinois Enterprise Zone Act; and

WHEREAS, the designated Enterprise Zone Area is outlined in the map in **EXHIBIT A** and described in the legal description presented in **EXHIBIT B**, which exhibits are attached to this Intergovernmental Agreement and incorporated herein by reference;

WHEREAS, the Zone area exceeds the minimum requirement of meeting 3 of the 10 criteria specified in the Illinois Enterprise Act (20 ILCS 655/4 (f)); as demonstrated in the Enterprise Zone Qualifications Report, **EXHIBIT C** attached hereto; and

WHEREAS, the Counties and the Municipalities declared and affirmed that the Zone Area is qualified for designation as an Enterprise Zone in accordance with the provisions of the Enterprise Zone Act.

NOW, THEREFORE, IN CONSIDERATION OF THE MUTUAL PROMISES CONTAINED HEREIN, THE RECITALS HEREIN ABOVE SET FORTH AND OTHER GOOD AND VALUABLE CONSIDERATIONS, RECEIPT OF WHICH IS HEREBY ACKNOWLEDGED, IT IS HEREBY AGREED BETWEEN THE COUNTIES AND THE MUNICIPALITIES, AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. INCORPORATION BY REFERENCE

The Preamble to this Agreement and all Exhibits referred to in this Agreement and its Preamble are hereby incorporated herein as if fully set forth in this Section 1.

SECTION 2. DESIGNATION

The Municipalities and Counties have adopted such Ordinances as are convenient and necessary to designate and implement an Enterprise Zone pursuant to the Illinois Enterprise Zone Act. This Enterprise Zone is named and known as the "Lincoln & 394 Corridor Enterprise Zone".

SECTION 3. INCENTIVES

The State of Illinois, Counties and Municipalities offer incentives designed to encourage businesses in the private sector to locate and expand within Enterprise Zones, subject to terms, conditions, rules and limitations as legally provided.

STATE INCENTIVES

- **Sales Tax Exemption** – A 6.25 percent state sales tax exemption is permitted on building materials to be used in an Enterprise Zone. The Materials must be permanently affixed to the property and must be purchased from a qualified retailer.
- **Enterprise Zone Machinery and Equipment Consumables/Pollution Control Facilities Sales Tax Exemption** – A 6.25 percent state sales tax exemption of purchases of tangible personal property to be used in the manufacturing or assembly process or in the operation of a pollution control facility within an Enterprise Zone is available. Eligibility is based on a business making an investment in an Enterprise Zone of at least \$5 million in qualified property that creates a minimum of 200 fulltime-equivalent jobs, a business investing at least \$40 million in a zone and retaining at least 2,000 jobs, or a business investing at least \$40 million in a zone which causes the retention of at least 80 percent of the jobs existing on the date it is certified to receive the exemption.
- **Enterprise Zone Utility Tax Exemption** – A state utility tax exemption on gas, electricity and the Illinois Commerce Commission’s administrative charge and telecommunication excise tax is available to businesses located in Enterprise Zones. Eligible businesses must make an investment of at least \$5 million in qualified property that creates a minimum of 200 full-time equivalent jobs in Illinois, an investment of \$20 million that retains at least 1,000 full-time-equivalent jobs, or an investment of \$175 million that creates 150 full-time equivalent jobs in Illinois. The majority of the jobs created must be located in the Enterprise Zone where the investment occurs.
- **Enterprise Zone Investment Tax Credit** – A state investment tax credit of 0.5 percent is allowed a taxpayer who invests in qualified property in a Zone. Qualified property includes machinery, equipment and buildings. The credit may be carried forward for up to five years. This credit is in addition to the regular 0.5 percent Investment tax credit, which is available throughout the state, and up to 0.5 percent credit for increased employment over the previous year.
- **Contribution Deduction** - Businesses may deduct double the value of a cash or in-kind contribution to an approved project of a Designated Zone Organization from taxable income.

LOCAL INCENTIVES AND FEES

Local governments, through the assistance and coordination of the Enterprise Zone Administrator, may provide a variety of local incentives to further encourage economic growth and investment within enterprise zones. The incentives offered are determined by counties municipalities. The following Enterprise Zone incentives are hereby offered:

- a) Abatement or reimbursement of 50% of the municipal portion of property taxes on new improvements for industrial, commercial, or institutional properties during the first five years following the completion of these improvements. This benefit will not be applicable if the project investor is also the recipient of tax relief for this property under the terms of a tax increment finance (TIF) agreement or other substantial property tax abatement provided by a unit of local government.

- b) Waiver of 50% of initial building permit fees for industrial, commercial, or institutional projects.
- c) The Enterprise Zone will provide officials of municipalities that are signatories to the Intergovernmental Agreement, which is Attachment D to this Ordinance, with certain written documentation and materials relative to additional incentives, including public or not-for-profit financing and workforce development programs, which municipal officials may make available to the project developer, and other interested individuals. There is no representation that the documents and materials provided by the Enterprise Zone include all incentives and program available to the project.

The Zone Administrator shall file a copy of the Enterprise Zone's fee schedule with the Department of Commerce and Economic Opportunity by April 1 of each year. The Zone Administrator may charge up to 0.5% of the cost of building materials of the project associated with the Enterprise Zone, provided that a maximum fee of no more than \$50,000 is permitted (20 ILCS 655/8.2 (c) as to each project.

SECTION 4. ZONE MANAGEMENT:

Upon approval of the Enterprise Zone and certification by the Department of Commerce and Economic Opportunity each party to this Agreement shall appoint a representative to serve and participate in a zone management organization that is hereby designated and to be known as the Joint Enterprise Zone Governing Council (the "Council"). The Council will by majority vote adopt rules and procedures for the management of the Enterprise Zone, including its financial matters. This Council is the governing body of the Enterprise Zone and will appoint the Zone Administrator. Decisions on appointment or removal of the Zone Administrator shall be made in the following manner:

- (a) Nominations shall be received from members of the Council for appointment of the Zone Administrator. Appointment of the Zone Administrator shall be by two-thirds vote of the Council.
- (b) The Zone Administrator may be removed by two-thirds vote of the Council.
- (c) The Zone Administrator must be an employee or officer of one of the Municipalities or one of the Counties.

SECTION 5. ZONE ADMINISTRATOR:

The Zone Administrator is responsible for the day-to-day operation of the Enterprise Zone including the following duties:

- (a) Supervise the implementation of the provisions of this Intergovernmental Agreement and the Illinois Enterprise Zone Act.
- (b) Act as a liaison between the Counties, Municipalities, the Illinois Department of Commerce Economic Opportunity, Designated Zone Organizations, and other State, Federal and local agencies, whether public or private.
- (c) Conduct an ongoing evaluation of the Enterprise Zone Programs and submit evaluative reports at least annually to the Council.
- (d) Promote the coordination of other relevant programs, including, but not limited to, housing, community and economic development, small business, financial assistance and employment training within the Enterprise Zone.
- (e) Recommend qualified Designated Zone Organizations to the Council.
- (f) Have other such duties as specified by the Council, including the appointment of authorized personnel as appropriate, to assure the smooth operation of the Enterprise Zone.

SECTION 6. DESIGNATED ZONE ORGANIZATIONS:

The Council, at its discretion, may select Designated Zone Organizations, pursuant to the qualifications enumerated in the Enterprise Zone Act 20 ILCS 655/3(d) and delegate the performance of permissible services or functions to said Designated Zone Organizations. Nothing herein shall be deemed to limit or restrict the right of the Council to delegate operational responsibilities to Designated Zone Organizations or other appropriate entities, permitted by law. Provided that no delegation including performance, services or functions, is effective until the proposed Designated Zone Organization is approved, pursuant to Application duly filed, by the Department of Commerce and Economic Opportunity.

SECTION 7. AMENDMENTS TO THIS AGREEMENT:

This Agreement shall remain in full force and effect unless amended or modified by the mutual written agreement of the parties. Except as expressly set forth above, nothing contained within this paragraph shall be construed to bar or limit the rights of either the Counties or the Municipalities to enforce the terms of this Agreement.

SECTION 8. **DURATION OF AGREEMENT:**

This Agreement shall be in full force and effect during the legal existence of the Enterprise Zone unless duly terminated, amended, extended, renewed or revised by the mutual written agreement of the respective corporate authorities of the Municipalities and the Counties.

SECTION 9. **REPRESENTATION BY THE PARTIES:**

The Parties represent, warrant, and agree, to and with each other, that each has taken all necessary corporate and legal action to authorize the execution, delivery, and performance on their part of this Agreement, and the performance hereto by each will not be in contravention of any resolutions, ordinances, laws, contracts, or agreements to which it is a party or to which it is subject. The Parties shall deliver to each other certified copies of all resolutions or ordinances authorizing the execution and performance of this Agreement.

SECTION 10. **FAILURE TO ENFORCE:**

The failure of any party hereto to enforce any of the provisions of this Agreement, or the waiver thereof in any instance, shall not be construed as a general waiver thereof in any instance, nor shall it be construed as a general waiver or relinquishment on its part of any such provision, but the same shall, nevertheless, be and remain in full force and effect.

SECTION 11. **CAUSES BEYOND CONTROL:**

No party to this Agreement shall be liable to another for failure, default or delay in performing any of its obligations hereunder, provided such failure, default or delay in performing any of its obligations specified herein is caused by strikes; by forces of nature; unavoidable accident; fire; acts of public enemy; or order of court. Should any of the foregoing occur, the parties hereto agree to proceed with diligence to do what is reasonable and necessary so that each party may perform its obligations under this Agreement.

SECTION 12. **NOTICES:**

Any notice required by this Agreement shall be in writing and shall be served by personal delivery on the municipal/county clerk or chief administrative officer of the receiving party. In lieu of personal service, required notices may be served by certified mail, return receipt requested, addressed to the municipal/county clerk or chief administrative officer of the receiving party.

Notices shall be deemed served on the day of personal delivery or on the fourth day following mailing.

SECTION 13. RESERVATION OF RIGHTS:

Nothing in this Agreement is intended to confer a benefit or right of enforcement upon any third party. Further, both parties specifically reserve all rights, privileges and immunities conferred upon them by law.

SECTION 14. AGENCY:

Neither party is an agent of the other party nor shall neither incur any costs, expenses or obligations on behalf of the other.

SECTION 15. COMPLETE AGREEMENT:

This Agreement sets forth the complete understanding between the parties relating to the terms and conditions hereof and any amendment hereto to be effective must be in writing and duly authorized and signed by the duly authorized representative of the parties.

SECTION 16. SERVERABILITY:

If any provision of this Agreement shall be declared invalid for any reason, such invalidation shall not affect other provisions of this Agreement which can be given effect without the invalid provisions and to this end the provisions of this Agreement are to be severable.

SECTION 17. CONSTRUCTION:

This Agreement shall be construed in accordance with the laws of the State of Illinois.

SECTION 18. EFFECTIVE DATE:

This Agreement shall be in full force and effect as of the date set forth below.

ORDINANCE No. 14-027

**AN ORDINANCE AMENDING DIVISION 2 (IMPOUNDMENT) OF ARTICLE XI
(IMPOUNDMENT OF VEHICLES FOR ORDINANCE VIOLATIONS) OF CHAPTER
74 (TRAFFIC AND VEHICLES) OF THE VILLAGE CODE**

WHEREAS, the Village of Sauk Village, Cook and Will Counties, Illinois, is a non-home rule municipality pursuant to the Illinois Constitution; and

WHEREAS, the President and Board of Trustees have determined that the use of motor vehicles during the commission of criminal activities poses a threat to the public health, safety and welfare; and

WHEREAS, the Corporate Authorities of the Village of Sauk Village have determined that it is in the best interest of the Village and its residents that Division 2 (Impoundment) of Article XI (Impoundment of Vehicles for Ordinance Violations) of Chapter 74 (Traffic and Vehicles) of the Village Code be amended as further set forth herein.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the President and the Board of Trustees of the Village of Sauk Village, Cook and Will Counties, Illinois, as follows:

SECTION ONE. Recitals. The foregoing recitals are adopted as express findings of the Corporate Authorities of the Village of Sauk Village and are incorporated herein by specific reference.

SECTION TWO. That Sections 74-333 through 74-358 of Division 2 (Impoundment) of Article XI (Impoundment of Vehicles for Ordinance Violations) of Chapter 74 (Traffic and Vehicles) of the Village Code be and are hereby stricken in their entirety and replaced with the following Sections 74-333 through 74-344:

74-333: IMPOUNDMENT OF MOTOR VEHICLES USED IN CONNECTION WITH ILLEGAL ACTIVITIES:

A. Violations Authorizing Impoundment: A motor vehicle, operated with the permission, express or implied, of the owner of record, that is used in connection with the following violations, shall be subject to tow and impoundment by the village, and the owner of record of said vehicle shall be liable to the village for an administrative fee in addition to any towing and storage fees, as hereinafter provided:

1. Operation or use of a motor vehicle in the commission or attempted commission of any offense for which a motor vehicle may be seized and forfeited pursuant to 720 Illinois Compiled Statutes 5/36-1 et seq., shall subject the owner to an administrative fee of five hundred dollars (\$500.00).

2. Driving under the influence of alcohol, other drug or drugs, intoxicating compounds, in violation of 625 Illinois Compiled Statutes 5/11-501, shall subject the owner to an administrative fee of five hundred dollars (\$500.00).

3. Operation or use of a motor vehicle in connection with the commission or attempted commission of any felony offense in violation of the provisions of the Illinois Cannabis Control Act, 720 Illinois Compiled Statutes 550/1, shall subject the owner to an administrative fee of five hundred dollars (\$500.00).

4. Operation or use of a motor vehicle in connection with the commission or attempted commission of any offense in violation of the Illinois controlled substances act, 720 Illinois Compiled Statutes 570/100 et seq., shall subject the owner to an administrative fee of five hundred dollars (\$500.00).

5. Operation or use of a motor vehicle in connection with the commission or attempted commission of an offense in violation of 720 Illinois Compiled Statutes 5/24-1 (unlawful use of weapons), in violation of 720 Illinois Compiled Statutes 5/24-1.5 (reckless discharge of a firearm), or in violation of 720 Illinois Compiled Statutes 5/24-3.1 (unlawful possession of firearms and firearm ammunition), shall subject the owner to an administrative fee of five hundred dollars (\$500.00).

6. Driving while a driver's license, permit, or privilege to operate a motor vehicle is suspended or revoked pursuant to Section 6-303 of the Illinois Vehicle Code shall subject the owner to an administrative fee of five hundred dollars (\$500.00); except that vehicles shall not be subjected to seizure or impoundment if the suspension is for an unpaid citation (parking or moving) or due to failure to comply with emission testing.

7. Operation or use of a motor vehicle while soliciting, possessing or attempting to solicit or possess cannabis or a controlled substance, as defined by the Cannabis Control Act or the Illinois Controlled Substances Act, shall subject the owner to an administrative fee of five hundred dollars (\$500.00).

8. Operation or use of a motor vehicle with an expired driver's license, in violation of Section 6-101 of the Illinois Vehicle Code, if the period of expiration is greater than one year, shall subject the owner to an administrative fee of five hundred dollars (\$500.00).

9. Operation or use of a motor vehicle without ever having been issued a driver's license or permit, in violation of Section 6-101 of the Illinois Vehicle Code, or operation of a motor vehicle

without ever having been issued a driver's license or permit due to a person's age, shall subject the owner to an administrative fee of five hundred dollars (\$500.00).

10. Operation or use of a motor vehicle by a person against whom a warrant has been issued by a circuit clerk in Illinois for failing to answer charges that the driver violated Section 6-101, 6-303, or 11-501 of the Illinois Vehicle Code, shall subject the owner to an administrative fee of five hundred dollars (\$500.00).

11. Operation or use of a motor vehicle in the commission of or in the attempt to commit, an offense in violation of article 16 or 16A of the Criminal Code of 1961 or the Criminal Code of 2012, shall subject the owner to an administrative fee of five hundred dollars (\$500.00).

12. Operation or use of a motor vehicle in the commission of, or in the attempt to commit, any other misdemeanor or felony offense in violation of the Criminal Code of 1961 or the Criminal Code of 2012, shall subject the owner to an administrative fee of five hundred dollars (\$500.00).

74-334: General Regulations:

This Ordinance shall not replace or otherwise abrogate any existing state or federal laws or Village ordinances pertaining to vehicle seizure, towing and impoundment, and the owner shall be subject to the penalties provided in this Ordinance in addition to any penalties that may be assessed by a court for any criminal charges.

74-335: Notice:

Whenever a police officer has probable cause to believe that a vehicle is subject to towing and impoundment pursuant to this Ordinance, the police officer shall provide for the towing of the vehicle to a facility authorized by the Village. Before or at a time the vehicle is towed, the police officer shall make a reasonable attempt to notify the owner, lessee, or person identifying himself or herself as the owner or lessee of the vehicle, or any person found to be in control of the vehicle at the time of the alleged offense, if there is such a person, of the fact of the impoundment, and of the vehicle owner's right to request a preliminary vehicle impoundment hearing to be conducted pursuant to Section 74-336. The Village shall also provide notice that the vehicle shall be impounded pending the completion of an administrative hearing, unless the owner or lessee of the vehicle or a lienholder posts with the Village a cash bond in the amount of five hundred dollars (\$500.00) and pays the accrued towing and storage charges.

74-336: Preliminary Hearing:

If the owner of record of a vehicle impounded pursuant to this Ordinance desires to appeal the impoundment, said owner must make a request for preliminary hearing within seventy-two (72) hours of the impoundment, excluding Saturdays, Sundays and Village holidays. Said request shall be in writing and filed with the Police Department. The Village hearing officer shall conduct such preliminary hearing within forty-eight (48) hours after receipt of the request, excluding

Saturdays, Sundays and Village holidays. All interested persons shall be given a reasonable opportunity to be heard at the preliminary vehicle impoundment hearing. The formal rules of evidence shall not apply at the hearing and hearsay evidence shall be admissible only if it is the type commonly relied upon by reasonably prudent persons in the conduct of their affairs. If, after the hearing, the hearing officer determines there is probable cause to believe that the vehicle is subject to impoundment pursuant to this Ordinance, he or she shall order the continued impoundment of the vehicle as provided in this Ordinance unless the owner of the vehicle posts with the Village a cash bond in the amount of five hundred dollars (\$500.00) and pays the tow company any applicable towing and storage fees. If the hearing officer determines that there is no such probable cause, the vehicle will be returned without penalty or other fees.

74-337: Hearing:

Within ten (10) days after a vehicle is impounded pursuant to this Ordinance, the police department shall notify by personal service or certified mail, return receipt requested, the owner of record, any lien holder of record, or the lessee of the vehicle of the date, time and location of a hearing that will be conducted, pursuant to this Ordinance. This hearing will be conducted no later than forty-five (45) days after the date of impoundment. The hearing shall be conducted by a hearing officer, designated by the Village President with the Village Board approval. The hearing officer will be an attorney licensed to practice law in the State of Illinois for a minimum of three (3) years. The owner will appear at the hearing and enter a plea of guilty or not guilty. If a plea of guilty is entered, the cause will be disposed of on the basis of the plea of guilty at that time. If the owner pleads not guilty, a hearing shall be conducted and held. All interested persons shall be given a reasonable opportunity to be heard at the hearing. At any time prior to the hearing date, the hearing officer may, at the request of either party, direct witnesses to appear and give testimony at the hearing. The formal rules of evidence will not apply at the hearing and hearsay evidence shall be admissible only if it is the type commonly relied upon by reasonably prudent persons in the conduct of their affairs.

If, after the hearing, the hearing officer determines, by a preponderance of the evidence, that the vehicle was used in connection with a violation set forth in this Ordinance, the hearing officer shall enter a written order finding the owner of record of the vehicle civilly liable to the Village for an administrative fee in the amount of five hundred dollars (\$500.00) and requiring the vehicle to continue to be impounded until the owner pays the administrative fee to the Village plus fees to tow company for the towing and storage of the vehicle. If the owner has already posted a cash bond in the amount of five hundred dollars (\$500.00) to secure release of the vehicle, it shall be forfeited to the Village. If the owner of record fails to appear at the hearing, the hearing officer shall enter a default order in favor of the Village requiring payment to the Village of the administrative fee of five hundred dollars (\$500.00) plus payment to the tow company of fees for towing and storage of the vehicle. If the hearing officer finds no such violation occurred, the hearing officer shall order, in writing, the immediate return of the owner's vehicle or cash bond without fees.

74-338: Administrative Fee:

If an administrative fee is imposed pursuant to this Ordinance, such fee shall constitute a debt due and owing to the Village. If a cash bond has been posted pursuant to this Ordinance the bond shall be applied to the fee. If a vehicle has been impounded when such a fee is imposed, the Village may seek to obtain a judgment on the debt and enforce such judgment against the vehicle's owner as provided by law. Except as provided otherwise in this Section, a vehicle shall continue to be impounded until the fee is paid to the Village and any applicable towing fees and storage fees are paid to the tow company, in which case possession of the vehicle shall be given to the person who is legally entitled to possess the vehicle, or the vehicle is sold or otherwise disposed of to satisfy a judgment to enforce a lien as provided by law. If the administrative fee and other applicable fees are not paid within forty-five (45) days after an administrative fee is imposed against an owner of record who defaults by failing to appear at the hearing, the vehicle shall be deemed unclaimed and shall be disposed of in the manner provided by the Illinois Vehicle Code for the disposition of unclaimed vehicles. In all other cases, if the administrative fee and applicable fee are not paid within thirty (30) days after the expiration of time at which administrative review of the hearing officer's determination may be sought, or within thirty (30) days after an action seeking administrative review has been resolved in favor of the Village, whichever is applicable, the vehicle shall be deemed unclaimed and shall be disposed of in the manner provided by law for the disposition of unclaimed vehicles under the Illinois Vehicle Code.

Unless stayed by a court of competent jurisdiction, any fine, penalty, or administrative fee imposed under this Section which remains unpaid in whole or in part after the expiration of the deadline for seeking judicial review under the Administrative Review Law may be enforced in the same manner as a judgment entered by a court of competent jurisdiction.

74-339: Vehicle Possession:

A. Except as otherwise specifically provided by law, no owner, lien holder or other person shall be legally entitled to take possession of a vehicle impounded under this Section until the administrative fee and fees applicable under this Ordinance have been paid. However, whenever a person with a lien of record against an impounded vehicle has commenced foreclosure proceedings, possession of the vehicle shall be given to that person if he or she agrees in writing to refund the Village the amount of the net proceeds of any foreclosure sale, less any amounts required to pay all lien holders of record, not to exceed the administrative fee, plus all other applicable fees.

74-340: Administrative Review:

Any owner, lien holder or other person with a legal interest in the vehicle, who is not satisfied with the decision of the hearing officer, shall have the right to appeal the decision to Circuit Court, pursuant to the Administrative Review Act, 735 ILCS 5/3-101 *et seq.*

74-341: Definitions:

As used in this Ordinance, the following definitions will apply:

1. "Owner of record" of a vehicle means the record titleholder as registered with the Secretary of State of Illinois or appropriate state official for a vehicle whose title is registered in a foreign state.
2. "Lien holder of record" means a lien holder who has properly registered or recorded their lien on the title of the vehicle with the Secretary of State of the State of Illinois or appropriate state official for a vehicle whose title is registered in a foreign state.
3. "Lessee" means an individual or other legal entity who has a written lease for the vehicle.

74-342: Sworn or Affirmed Police Report as Evidence:

In a hearing on the propriety of impoundment under this Ordinance, any sworn or affirmed report, including a report prepared in compliance with Section 11-501.1 of the Illinois Vehicle Code, that (a) is prepared in the performance of a law enforcement officer's duties and (b) sufficiently describes the circumstances leading to the impoundment, shall be admissible evidence of the vehicle owner's liability under this Ordinance, and shall support a finding of the vehicle owner's liability under this Ordinance, unless rebutted by clear and convincing evidence.

74-343: Exceptions to Violation of this Ordinance:

For purposes of this Division, a vehicle is not considered to have been used in a violation that would render the vehicle eligible for towing if (1) the vehicle used in the violation was stolen at the time and the theft was reported to the appropriate police authorities within 24 hours after the theft was discovered or reasonably should have been discovered; (2) the vehicle was operating as a common carrier and the violation occurred without the knowledge of the person in control of the vehicle; or (3) the alleged owner provides adequate proof that the vehicle has been sold to another person prior to the violation.

74-344: Investigation of status of vehicle encumbrance prior to return to owner.

Notwithstanding any other provision of this Division, no vehicle that was seized and impounded pursuant to an investigation shall be returned unless and until permitted by the investigating division as provided by law. Notwithstanding any other provision of this Division, no vehicle that was seized and impounded pursuant state and or federal laws shall be returned to the record owner unless and until the village has received notice from the appropriate state, or where applicable, federal officials that forfeiture proceedings:

- (1) Will not be instituted; or

(2) Have concluded and there is a settlement or a court order providing that the vehicle shall be returned to the owner of record.

SECTION THREE. If any section, paragraph, clause or provision of this Ordinance shall be held invalid, the invalidity thereof shall not affect any other provision of this Ordinance.

SECTION FOUR. Any ordinance or portion of any ordinance in conflict with any provisions of this Ordinance is hereby repealed solely to the extent of such conflict.

SECTION FIVE. This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect upon its passage, approval and publication in pamphlet form as provided by law.



ORDINANCE NUMBER 14-028

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER 82 "ZONING, PLANNING
AND DEVELOPMENT" OF THE ZONING ORDINANCE OF THE VILLAGE
OF SAUK VILLAGE, COOK COUNTY, ILLINOIS
(ADULT USE MORATORIUM EXTENSION)

WHEREAS, the Village of Sauk Village, Cook County, Illinois (the *AVillage@*) is a duly organized and existing municipal corporation created under the provisions of the laws of the State of Illinois and under the provisions of the Illinois Municipal Code, as from time to time supplemented and amended; and

WHEREAS, a temporary, 180-day moratorium was approved by the Corporate Authorities and implemented as of April 8, 2014 on the acceptance of applications for, and issuance of building permits, certificates of occupancy, zoning applications and other permits or licenses relating to adult uses should provide the Village with adequate time in which to consider potential amendments to the Village's zoning ordinance relating to adult uses; and

WHEREAS, it is not the intent of the Village to suppress any speech activities protected by the First Amendment, but rather to address the secondary effects of adult uses; and

WHEREAS, reasonable alternative avenues for sexually oriented communication are available during the term of this ordinance; and

WHEREAS, the Corporate Authorities have determined, in the best interest of the health, safety and welfare of the residents of the Village, to extend the moratorium an additional 180 days in order to properly research and amend the text of the Sauk Village Zoning Ordinance.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the President and Board of Trustees of the Village of Sauk Village, Cook and Will Counties, Illinois, as follows:

Section 1. The above recitals and legislative findings are found to be true and correct and are hereby incorporated herein and made a part hereof, as if fully set forth in their entirety.

Section 2. The Corporate Authorities find and determine that the extension of the 180 day moratorium is in the public interest, and is in furtherance of the progressive demands of orderly Village development.

Section 3. The duration of the adult use moratorium shall continue in effect for one-hundred and eighty (180) days from October 8, 2014 at 11:59 p.m., or until the Village Board terminates the moratorium, whichever occurs first.

Section 4. All sections of the Sauk Village Zoning Ordinance not addressed in this Ordinance or another amending ordinance shall remain in full force and effect.

Section 5. If any section, paragraph, clause or provision of this Ordinance shall be held invalid, the invalidity thereof shall not affect any other provision of this Ordinance.

Section 6. All ordinances, resolutions, motions or orders in conflict with this Ordinance are hereby repealed to the extent of such conflict.


Section 7. This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect immediately upon its passage due to the urgent need of protecting the health, safety and welfare of the residents of the Village.



**AN ORDINANCE FOR THE LEVY AND ASSESSMENT OF TAXES FOR THE
2014/2015 FISCAL YEAR FOR THE VILLAGE OF SAUK VILLAGE, COUNTIES OF
COOK AND WILL, ILLINOIS**

WHEREAS, the Village of Sauk Village, Cook and Will County, Illinois (the *AVillage@*) is a duly organized and existing municipal corporation created under the provisions of the laws of the State of Illinois and under the provisions of the Illinois Municipal Code, as from time to time supplemented and amended; and

WHEREAS, the President and Board of Trustees have determined that it is advisable, necessary and in the best interests of the Village to levy and assess taxes for the 2014/2015 fiscal year; and

WHEREAS, in connection with the adoption of its tax levy, the Village has complied with Sections 18-60 through 18-85 of the Illinois Truth in Taxation Law (35 ILCS 200/18-60 through 35 ILCS 200/18-85), the Open Meetings Act (5 ILCS 120/1, et seq.) and all other applicable state and local laws.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the President and Board of Trustees of the Village of Sauk Village, Cook and Will Counties, Illinois, as follows:

Section 1. That the above recitals and legislative findings are found to be true and correct and are hereby incorporated herein and made a part hereof, as if fully set forth in their entirety.

Section 2: The total amount of appropriations for all corporate purposes legally made to be collected from the tax levy of the current fiscal year is hereby ascertained to be the sum of Two Million, Two Hundred Sixty Two Thousand, Forty Two and 20/100 Dollars (\$2,262,042.20).

Section 3: The sum of Two Million, Two Hundred Sixty Two Thousand, Forty Two and 20/100 Dollars (\$2,262,042.20) being the total appropriations heretofore legally made that are to be collected from the tax levy of the current fiscal year of the Village for all corporate purposes of the Village, for purposes of providing for a Police Pension Fund, Fire Fighters' Pension Fund and such other corporate purposes as permitted by statute as set forth on Exhibit "A", which is attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference, as appropriated for the current fiscal year by the annual appropriation Ordinance of the Village for the fiscal year 2014/2015, passed by the President and Board of Trustees at a legally convened meeting, be, and the same is hereby levied upon all of the taxable property in the Village subject to taxation for the current year, the specific amounts as levied for the various funds heretofore named being included in Exhibit "A", the tax so levied being for the current fiscal year of the Village, and for said appropriation to be collected

from said tax levy, the total of which has been ascertained as aforesaid and being as provided in Exhibit "A", as if fully set forth herein.

Section 4: The total amount of Two Million, Two Hundred Sixty Two Thousand, Forty Two and 20/100 Dollars (\$2,262,042.20) ascertained above, be and is hereby levied and assessed on all property subject to taxation within the Village.

Section 5: There is hereby certified to the Cook County Clerk and to the Will County Clerk the total amount of Two Million, Two Hundred Sixty Two Thousand, Forty Two and 20/100 Dollars (\$2,262,042.20) which total amount the Village requires to be raised by taxation for the current fiscal year of the Village, and the Village Clerk is hereby authorized and directed to file a certified copy of this ordinance with the Cook County Clerk and the Will County Clerk.

Section 6: If any section, paragraph, clause or provision of this ordinance shall be held invalid, the invalidity thereof shall not affect any of the other provisions of this ordinance

Section 7: All ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed to the extent of such conflict.

Section 8: This ordinance shall be in full force and effect following its passage, approval and publication in the manner required by law.






