become too large for this small number of dedicated people.



Administration & Finance Department News

FREQUENT QUESTIONS

Sauk Village citizens have general questions that are covered in the "Resident Information Booklet", but it helps to cover some of the more frequently asked questions elsewhere.

VEHICLE STICKERS - Vehicle stickers go on sale during the months of May and June of each year, but what happens if you buy a new car after June? You have **45 days from the date of purchase** of a new automobile to purchase your vehicle sticker for the initial price. If you do not purchase the vehicle sticker until after the 45th day then the late fees apply.

When a resident moves into the Village they have **30 days** to purchase a vehicle sticker for the initial price, after the 30-day period the late fees applies.

Water bills are sent out every other month for a total of six bills per year.

The section north of Sauk Trail gets billed on the even months of February, April, June, August, October and December.

The section south of Sauk Trail and east of Torrence Avenue get billed on the odd months of January, March, May, July, September and November.

The water bill includes charges for water, sewer, garbage and utility tax. The water rate is \$2.50 per 1,000 gallons. Sewer rate is \$0.63 per 1,000 gallons plus a surcharge of \$6.70 per month. The garbage charge of \$23.88 includes the rental of the large tote cans. There is also a 5% utility tax charge, which is also on gas, electric and telephone (including cell phone).

As a reminder, the Village has been in the process of installing new electronic meters. This provides for more accurate bills and prevents estimated billing. To set up an appointment please call the Village Hall at 758-3330.

WATER BILL PAYMENTS – If your water is shut off for non-payment there is a \$25.00 turn-on fee.

By ordinance if you receive a **red shut-off** you have **2 weeks** to make payment before your water is shut off.

WHY IS MY WATER BILL SO HIGH? – The most common reason is that you have a water leak (example a running toilet). Check if you have a leak by observing your new electronic meter, if the red arrow is turning when all water is supposed to be shut off you have a leak.

If you have questions please contact the Village Hall during business hours. We are open Monday through Friday from 8:00 am until 5:00 pm and on Tuesday evenings from 6:30 pm until 9:00 pm.



Sauk Village Fire Department

I want to start out with a great big THANK YOU for all of those who attended our annual open house at the fire station on Saturday, October 8. The open house was a great success. Due to a slight scheduling snafu, the date had to be changed after the last edition of SAUK TALK hit the presses. Please accept my sincere apologies for anyone who missed the open house due to this problem.

Those that were in attendance got to practice using a fire extinguisher on our new propane extinguisher prop. They got to see what goes on through some of our programs like fire investigation and training and try their hand at some of the obstacles firefighters go through during training. There were games and prizes for the kids and rides in the Snorkel basket.

Also, during the open house, Captain Rich Atwood and Engineer Kevin Phillips did a special power point presentation on their recent trip to New Orleans. They responded as part of the first wave of Illinois firefighters to go to Louisiana to help with Hurricane Katrina relief efforts. Atwood and Phillips left with a group from other local departments on September 5 and returned on September 18. Once in New Orleans, Atwood and Phillips had many assignments which included helping out around the camp (which housed 1000+ firefighters and support personnel), decontaminating vehicles, staffing/cleaning New Orleans fire stations, and helping New Orleans firefighters clean out their homes.

As part of Fire Prevention Week, which was from October 9 through October 15, Sauk Village Firefighters visited Wagoner, Strassburg, and Rickover schools. During the assemblies, students were encouraged to draw "home escape plans" in case of fire in their homes. The response to this was great and all students that participated received a certificate.



Among other things, one of the topics discussed at the school assemblies was electrical safety. Through a strange work of timing, the Sauk Village Fire Department responded to a fire call at 5:15 that Monday morning, just hours before the first assembly at Wagoner.

With permission of the homeowner, the extension cord and power strip that caused the small fire was shown to the students. Though this ended up being a relatively minor event, it could have been significantly worse. Take note- this is your fire prevention lesson for this edition.

- A light duty extension cord was plugged into the wall receptacle.
- A power strip extension cord was plugged into the light duty extension cord with the help of a 3 prong adapter.
- Plugged into the power strip were a box fan, television, and clock radio.

The fire started at the plug where the 3 prong adapter, extension cord, and power strip all came together, resulting in a melted glob of plastic and a patch of burned carpet.

The lesson learned is this: power strips contain a built in safety feature. The safety feature only works if the strip is used properly. A power strip CANNOT be used in conjunction with any other type of extension cord. Plain extension cords can (and in this case- did) override the power strip's safety feature.

Also, 3 prong adapters (used to convert a three prong plug to fit a 2 prong plug) are hazardous. Yes- they are commonly used and can be bought any where, but that doesn't make them safe. Just like extension cords, the adapter should not be used on any fixture or appliance long term. Meaning, if it's something that's plugged in all the time, have the appropriate electric receptacle installed or use a power strip of the appropriate length.

The main theme for Fire Prevention Week was candle safety. With the holiday season upon us, candle use will be at its peak. Please use candles carefully, don't let children play with or around them, and remember- **WHEN YOU GO OUT, BLOW OUT!**

Have a safe and happy holiday season.

Make sure gutters are cleaned and free of leaves & debris.


Have your furnace cleaned and serviced and if you have a fireplace, have it cleaned and serviced before using.

**Home Improvement Help Available
Through CDBG Home Grants**

Does that sweet Sauk Village home of yours need fixing up? A new roof? New furnace? Siding? Chicago Southland Development, Inc. (CSDI), the Cook County authorized CDBG program administrator for your community can help if you meet the following qualifications:



Household income meets the qualifications. You are the owner and live in the home. There is equity to cover the amount of the repairs.

- 1 Person in Household (HH) income not to exceed \$40,250
- 2 people in HH - income not to exceed \$46,000
- 3 people in HH - income not to exceed \$51,750
- 4 people in HH - income not to exceed \$57,500
- 5 people in HH - income not to exceed \$62,100
- 6 people in HH - income not to exceed \$66,700
- 7 people in HH - income not to exceed \$71,300
- 8+ people in HH - income not to exceed \$75,900

If you said yes to the above questions, CSDI can rehabilitate your home with Federal CDBG Funds. You will not make monthly payments and there is never any interest.

How does the program work?

Your home will be liened for the full dollar amount of the rehabilitation. When the title transfers, the entire amount is paid back from the proceeds of the sale.

AFFECT YOUR NEIGHBORHOOD

Winter Safety Tips

With the colder months of the year now upon us, the following are a few safety tips for you and your family to keep in mind.

CANDLES - Always put candles in non-tip candleholders before you light them, and do not burn candles near decorations or displays. Keep candles well away from curtains, and never put candles in windows or near exits. Never use lighted candles on a tree or near other evergreens. Never leave a room with a candle burning or within reach of small children.

CARBON MONOXIDE - Consider installing detectors on every level of the home, near sleeping areas where the audible alarm can be heard. If the alarm goes off, exit the home and call 911. Recognize the symptoms of carbon monoxide poisoning and exit the home immediately if you suspect the presence of carbon monoxide. Call 911 from a safe location.

CHRISTMAS TREES

- A fresh tree is green.
- Fresh needles are hard to pull from branches.
- When bent between your fingers, fresh needles do not break.
- The trunk butt of a fresh tree is sticky with resin.
- When the trunk of a tree is bounced on the ground, a shower of falling needles shows that tree is too dry.

Place tree away from fireplaces, radiators and other heat sources. Heated rooms dry trees out rapidly, creating fire hazards. Cut off about two inches of the trunk to expose fresh wood for better water absorption. Trim away branches as necessary to set tree trunk in the base of a sturdy, water-holding stand with wide spread feet. Keep the stand filled with water while the tree is indoors. Place the tree out of the way of traffic and do not block doorways. Use thin guy-wires to secure a large tree to walls or ceiling. These wires are almost invisible.

Avoid smoking near flammable decorations. Avoid wearing loose flowing clothes - particularly long, open sleeves - near open flames - such as those of a fireplace, stove, or candlelit table.

Never burn candles near evergreens. Burning evergreens in the fireplace can also be hazardous. When dry, greens burn like tinder. Flames can flare out of control, and send sparks flying into a room, or up the chimney to ignite creosote deposits.

ELECTRIC SPACE HEATERS - Space heaters need their space! Keep combustibles at least three feet away from each heater. When buying a heater, look for a thermostat control mechanism and a switch that automatically shuts off the power if the heater falls over. Heaters are not dryers or tables! Don't dry or store objects on top of your heater. Keep children and pets away from space heaters. Never leave children in a room alone when a space heater is in use.

ESCAPE PLANS - Develop an escape route with two exits from every room. Pick a meeting place in a safe location so all family members can be accounted for. Call the fire department from a cordless phone, a neighbor's home or another safe location. Never re-enter a burning building for any reason. Practice your home escape plan every six months and consider practicing it at night when most home fires occur.

FIREPLACES - Keep fire where it belongs - in the fireplace! Have

chimneys inspected by a professional before the start of heating season. Make sure you have a screen large enough to catch flying sparks and rolling logs. Clean your chimney regularly - creosote build-up can ignite your chimney, roof and the whole house! Store cooled ashes in a tightly sealed metal container. Cardboard boxes and paper bags can quickly catch fire. Only burn materials appropriate for a fireplace, never burn trash or paper, burning paper can float up a chimney and onto your roof or into your yard.

FURNACES - Have your heating systems inspected by a qualified service professional at least once a year. This inspection should include lubrication and cleaning, replacing filters, a check of belts and thermostats and having vents cleared of obstructions, as necessary.

GENERAL PREPARATION - Have extra blankets on hand, and ensure that everyone in your household has a warm coat, gloves or mittens, a hat and water-resistant boots. Use products only for their intended purposes. Hair dryers aren't intended to thaw frozen pipes, dry clothing or warm bedding. If you use an electric blanket to keep warm on a cold night, follow the manufacturer's instructions and make sure you turn it off and unplug it when it's not in use. Never tuck an electrical blanket in.

HOLIDAY LIGHTS - Indoors or outside, use only lights that have been tested for safety. Identify these by the label from an independent testing laboratory. Check each set of lights, new or old, for broken or cracked sockets, frayed or bare wires, or loose connections. Discard damaged sets or repair them before using. Fasten outdoor lights securely to trees, house, walls or other firm support to protect from wind damage. Use no more than three standard-size sets of lights per single extension cord. Turn off all lights on trees and other decorations when you go to bed or leave the house. Lights could short and start a fire. Never use electric lights on a metallic tree. The tree can become charged with electricity from faulty lights, and any person touching a branch could be electrocuted! To avoid this danger, use colored spotlights above or beside a tree, never fastened onto it! Keep "bubbling" lights away from children. These lights with their bright colors and bubbling movement can tempt curious children to break candle-shaped glass, which can cut, and attempt to drink liquid, which contains a hazardous chemical.

PLAN FOR SAFETY - Remember, there is no substitute for common sense. Look for and eliminate potential danger spots near candles, fireplaces, trees, and/or electrical connections.

SMOKE DETECTORS - Have one on every level of the home. Consider installing a smoke alarm near bedrooms and on each floor of your home. Test it monthly. If it has a 9-volt battery, change the battery once a year.

SNOW - Artificial snow sprays can irritate lungs if inhaled. To avoid injury, read container labels; follow directions carefully.

WINDOWS - Caulking around windows and other openings can stop the cold air invasion dead in its tracks. Caulking and a caulking gun from your local hardware are inexpensive and easy to use. A warmer home and lower utility bills can result.

WOOD STOVES - If you use a wood-burning stove, have the chimney connection and flue checked each year. Make sure the stove is placed on an approved stove board to protect the floor from heat and coals. Be sure wood or coal stoves bear the label of a recognized testing laboratory and meet fire codes. Follow manufacturers' recommendations for proper use and maintenance. **Never use your**


